Election Information

The General Election will be held on November 4, 2014, 7:00 AM to 8:00 PM. The in-person absentee

voting will be October 20 to October 31, 2014 (ending at 5:00 PM that day). I'm anticipating there will be many in-person absentee voters in November. Please be patient.

NOTE

If you need an absentee ballot

mailed to you, the request must be in writing. The Government Accountability Board has a form GAB-121 online that can be filled out and mailed to the Clerk. If you don't have access to the internet, you can write a note containing your name, address in Erin where you would like it mailed (if different than your address), your signature, and that you request an absentee ballot for the November 2014 election. REMEMBER: You must be a registered voter in the Town of Erin before you can request an absentee ballot.

There are Menu items along the left side of the page: *Board and Committees* brings you to the Agenda or

Zoning has checklists if you are building an accessory structure (garage or shed), new pool or fence, or are looking into a property split.

- *Building inspection* has PDFs of applications for electrical, plumbing, HVAC, or building permits.

NOTE FROM THE TOWN CHAIRMAN Dennis Kenealy

You may have noticed that the Town is undertaking some much needed repairs to the Hall. We have a new cement entrance, a new mobile cooler, and we have removed some office walls. We will be repairing the roof, replacing the floors and fixing some of the interior areas (including installing new lighting). These and more repairs will occur this year and next – they could no longer be put off. They will make the use of the Town Hall more energy efficient and safe.



Planning is proceeding for the 2017 US Open Golf outing. There will be more information in 2015 as the time approaches for the event. At this stage most of the planning is preliminary and will need to be revised, but all parties are starting to meet and present proposals regarding traffic, lodging, transportation, etc.

Finally, the Executive Committee and Town Board began the budget process at their October meetings. There do not appear to be any unusual items on the horizon so I anticipate a budget much as we have had the past few years; however, that is a preliminary thought – we will not know of all the needs and requests until then.

I've received many calls on trash pickup. The Town of Erin does not have trash pickup and each resident has to contract with either Advance Disposal at 262-367-6040 or Waste Management at 262-251-9560. The Town of Erin joined together years ago with the Town of Hartford for recycling. The Town of Hartford recycling center is open Thursdays from 2:00 PM to 6:00 PM and Saturdays from 8:00 AM until Noon. The address is 3370 County Road K. There you can take tin or aluminum cans, glass, plastics and more. Please stop by their recycling center and they can give you a handout to explain what recyclables they will take.

I've had calls regarding how to dispose of furniture. There is not a lot out there. If it is in good shape Goodwill will take it. Otherwise I have not found another place; you will need to contact your trash pickup company for that.

Electronics such as TVs, computers and computer components, VCR/DVD or Blu-Ray players and more cannot be thrown into the trash. A complete list of which electronics must be recycled can be found on the DNR site: <u>http://dnr.wi.gov/topic/ecycle/</u>. Goodwill in West Bend will take them for free whether they work or not. The TVs cannot have broken tubes or glass. As always, call before you go to make sure nothing has changed. Best Buy also takes electronics, but call to find out the fee.



COMMITTEE REPORTS

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT BRADLEY BAUTZ, DIRECTOR

By the time you receive this, the Town will be well into budget planning for 2015. I expect some increases in our fire contract costs. The largest part of my budget by far is the contractual fire amount to the three fire departments.

We are still looking towards June 2017, when the US Open comes to Erin Hills. They expect perhaps 50,000 spectators daily. The Wisconsin DOT has been working on traffic plans and roadway improvements. What will be done will depend on whether there will be parking in the area of the course, or if there will be remote off-site parking lots and shuttles bringing people in. A decision on that should come next year. It is all part of the planning process.

All Town residences should have received an address sign by now. If you were somehow missed or need a replacement, please contact me.

REMINDER

While the Town has discontinued brush pickup, I encourage you to recycle or make use of the brush drop-off at the Town's dump site.

If you need to burn, please keep the following advice in mind. Copies of the Town's burning ordinance are available from the Town, but here are the main points:

-No burning permits are required.

-When fire danger is high, very high or severe, all outdoor burning will be banned (this includes fireworks) by order of the Emergency Management Director or Town Chairman. Outdoor cooking (i.e. grills) is an exemption. For such a ban, I will notify the Sheriff's Department and local radio stations. Notices will also be found on the Town's posting boards and on the website.

-Open fires must be attended



- -The jurisdictional fire department or preferably the Sheriff's Office must be notified of any bonfire in excess of 10 feet in diameter or if a large area of grass is burned (i.e. over ¼ acre).
- -Fires can't be started on the roadway surface, and only leaves and grass can be burned in the right-of-way.
- -The burning of garbage, plastics, rubber, treated wood, petroleum products or anything that emits noxious or toxic odors is **PROHIBITED**. The DNR already bans the burning of these items because they pose a health hazard to residents.

Have a safe and happy fall.

2014 Summer Update

It doesn't feel like summer should be over but cooler temps are right around the corner. That means fall colors are coming our way. The summer was a mild one, but that didn't slow down Park activities. The Baseball Club filled both fields nearly every night of the week, while fans enjoyed the beautiful views of the Park and Holy Hill.

With the summer temps on the cool side and above-average rainfall, the Park grass grew faster than normal and the Park stayed a gorgeous dark green all summer long. Extra thanks for the special care provided by our Park Superintendent, Jeff Nienhaus, and mowing teams, as they balanced mowing the Park in sections to stay on top of an already busy maintenance season.

You may have noticed a new face around the Park. Patty Stewart has been putting in a number of hours maintaining the larger plantings around the Park. If you see her, give her a wave or say "Hi" – she is doing a great job.

If you like the colors around the main entrance flower beds, you can thank Brian Maresh. Brian has added fall colors to the main entrance for a number of years now, and it is a warm welcome to our Town Hall for visitors.

We want to welcome Kevin Kerrigan to the Park Board as the newest member and Baseball Club representative. Jeff and Kevin worked together to provide a low-cost plan to procure and install new scoreboards on both the north and south baseball fields. Their creative cooperation of labor and volunteers, along with net-zero budget planning, allowed for this significant improvement to the Park with no impact to Park or Town spending.

The walking paths and sport court areas received a facelift this summer with a new sealcoat and fresh painted lines. Come try out the newly painted full-size basketball court on the north end of the Park.

Not all Park projects are performed by contactors or vendors. Many of them are carried out by volunteers and local organizations. The Girl Scouts help out in the Park every year with volunteered hours and beautification projects. We are always looking for new Park project ideas and are willing to help organize a community project around a great idea. The Park and Town Boards have created a simplified process to collect ideas and donations for specific projects to be carried out in the Town. A special line item has been added to the Town budget and accounting process to allow individuals, or groups, to specify a unique project and a predefined budget and funding schedule. This means if you believe in a project you would like done at the Park and specify the tax-deductible donation, it cannot be used for anything else. Some of the special project "wish list" ideas may include, but are not limited to: badly needed new playground equipment, remodeling the Snack Shack, enhancing the Park entrances, a "Welcome to Erin" sign on the corner of

Holy Hill Road and Hwy 83, adding lights to the baseball fields, and extending the walking trails. If you have any questions or ideas, contact any of our committee members listed in this article.

Hartford Public Library

The Jack Russell Memorial Library at 100 Park Avenue in downtown Hartford would like to invite all Erin residents to visit the Library to check out the variety of materials and programs that are available for users of all ages. The Library is open to the public the following business hours: Monday through Thursday from 10:00 AM to 8:00 PM, Fridays from 10:00 AM to 5:30 PM, and on Saturdays from 9:00 AM until 2:00 PM.

Library cards are issued free of charge to Erin residents by providing a photo ID with current address. Children ages 5 through 8th Grade may obtain a card with parental approval. The process takes about five minutes, and you can borrow materials right away. The Library's website, which contains all the up-to-the-minute information concerning programs and other special activities, can be found at <u>www.hartfordlibrary.org</u>, and emails can be sent to <u>hartfordpl@hartfordlibrary.org</u>. The Library's telephone number is 262-673-8240.

The Friends of the Library have an exciting line-up of programs for adults in the Hartford area this fall. On October 15, author Clark Kidder discussed his grandmother's experiences as an Orphan Train rider in "Emily's Story."

Vesper guitar designer Neal Van Slett will be at the Library on November 12 to explain the production of his custom hand-made, one-of-a-kind instruments in Germantown.

On December 5, four self-published female authors will talk about how they were able to get their works released without using a major publishing house. All programs are held on Wednesdays beginning at 7:00 PM in the Library's community room. Early arrivals will get their choice of seats and enjoy refreshments. The Youth Library has also put together a variety of programs for the children. There will be special craft sessions involving Halloween, Winter and edible treat themes. Help the Library build a giant Lego tower by reading. Three Legos will be awarded for each book read, and you will get add them to the growing tower. See how big it can get before 2015 rolls around.

Weekly bedtime story hours are on Tuesday evenings at 7:00 PM, and preschool story sessions are on Wednesdays at 1:00 PM. There will also be a series of family movies on select Saturday mornings and special teen films on Monday nights. 

St. Patrick Preservation Group Tribute to Nancy Henke



It is with much sadness that we report the passing of Nancy Collins Henke on September 11, 2014. It could easily be said that Nancy (with the help of her husband, Evarist) was the Queen of all things historical in the Town of Erin and the surrounding communities. For those of us who have visited Nancy and Ev over the years, you could spend weeks paging through 250

binders full of information – from churches and cemeteries to dance halls and taverns – in Erin, Hartford, Richfield, Ashippun, and Polk, to name a few... Their collection of historical information has often been on display at special events, and the Henkes have donated some of these treasures to the History Room at the Jack Russell Memorial Library in Hartford.

Nancy and Evarist's 54th wedding anniversary (and Ev's 80th birthday) was September 10, and Nancy's last wish was that her cancer would not take her before then. The good Lord granted her request, and she passed away peacefully at Kathy's Hospice in West Bend the following morning, with Evarist by her side.

Nancy was born on March 6, 1936, one of nine children of James and Erna Collins. In 1938, the family moved to a 160-acre Town of Erin farm overlooking Druid Lake. Nancy's parents were actively involved in St. Patrick's Church of Erin, holding many positions, and Nancy's mom, Erna, played the organ for almost 30 years. Nancy would reminisce years later that "a lot of Sundays the parishioners visited longer outside the church than the actual Mass lasted." This love of St. Patrick's and the church community lasted Nancy's whole life. In 1955, she volunteered to type the St. Patrick's Ladies Altar Society Cookbook over her lunch hour at work and was given a Rosary for her work. The cookbook was reprinted in 2005 for the 150th Anniversary of St. Patrick's Church.

Upon graduation from Hartford High School, Nancy was employed as a secretary. She worked as an Executive Secretary at West Bend Aluminum for Hartford resident Paul Quick, who would say years later that she was one of the most conscientious and hard-working secretaries he had ever had. She also was an Executive Secretary at Wacker Industries. After her children were grown, she put her gardening expertise to work and was employed as a "transplanter" at Black's Nursery.

On September 10, 1960, Nancy Collins married Evarist Henke at St. Patrick's Church of Erin. Daughter, Mary, was born in 1961 and son, Michael, was born in 1965. In 1969, Nancy and Evarist built a home on Highway 83 in Erin (also referred to as Thompson), a short distance from St. Patrick's Church. Nancy followed in her parents' footsteps volunteering her time and talent as Treasurer, Vice President and President of the St. Patrick's Ladies Altar Society beginning in 1979. She also held positions on the Parish Council in 1972 and 1973 and from 1979 through 1981, and served as the Secretary-Trustee of the Parish Council from 1982 through the church's closing in 1999. She received a crucial liver transplant in the spring of 1999, which saved her life. Shortly thereafter she, along with Trustee Frank Weber, was called by then-Archbishop Weakland to a mandatory meeting regarding the closing of St. Patrick's Church. There were concerns as to whether Nancy was well enough to attend the meeting. No concern was needed as Archbishop Weakland discovered what parishioners knew -Nancy's strength, courage and wit was unmatched when it came to her beloved St. Patrick's Church. Some of us still laugh when we recall Nancy's response to the Archbishop's request to turn over the bank account of the St. Patrick's Ladies Altar Society to the Milwaukee Archdiocese . . . in the end, Nancy prevailed.

In 1996, the Town of Erin celebrated its 150th year of existence. An almost 300-page historical account of Erin Township was printed and Nancy compiled much of the information. After the closing of St. Patrick Parish in 1999, a group of parishioners formed a 501(c)3, the St. Patrick Preservation Fund, in 2000. Its mission was the historic preservation of the church, cemetery and grounds. Nancy served on the Board of Directors and as Secretary from 2000 until her retirement in 2005.

In 2005, St. Patrick Church of Erin (although defunct as a parish but still allowed to celebrate special occasion Masses) celebrated its 150th Anniversary. Nancy and daughter Mary Hasslinger worked for two years on a beautiful history book of St. Patrick's from its founding in 1855 until its closure as a parish in 1999. Nancy was also instrumental in planning the 150th St. Patrick Church Celebration, which included Mass at St. Patrick's and dinner at the Erin Town Hall, with almost 200 people in attendance (because that is all the Town Hall could hold!). In 2008, she was instrumental in planning the 150th Anniversary of the St. Patrick's Ladies Altar Society, with a dinner at the Hartford Golf Club.

Even as her health deteriorated, Nancy, with the help of her husband, Evarist, and daughter, Mary, continued her pursuit of gathering historical information on Erin Township. In November 2005, she became a founding member of the Erin Historical Society.

The St. Patrick Preservation Group will be forever indebted to Nancy, for without her passion, perseverance and hard work, the history of our beautiful Erin community, historic St. Patrick Church and surrounding areas would not have been documented for future generations. What a blessing and gift she was, and what a legacy she leaves to all of us...Godspeed Nancy Collins Henke...

Erin School's enrollment has continued to climb over the last few years. This year we are projecting to have 349 students in our classrooms compared to 344 for the 2013-14 school year. In 2012-13 we had 338 students and in 2011-12 we had 333 students. Erin School District is becoming a destination school. We are seeing more parents choose to send their children to our school through the open enrollment option. When questioned, many parents stated how impressed they were with the educational programing our students receive. Others like the idea of a small K-8 feeling and knowing their children will be in one building for their entire K-8 experience. Still others talk about how welcomed they felt when they toured the school. At Erin School, the staff strives to provide the best curriculum for our students in a caring and nurturing manner. We strive to build a relationship with each family as their children pass through the grade levels. Our focus is to keep the class sizes smaller while providing a larger range for our students to grow.

This year, the District is providing advanced opportunities to several of our students. We have over half of our 8th graders (26) taking Honors Algebra 1, while two of our students are attending HUHS to take Honors Algebra II. We have several 6th and 7th graders this year bumping up a grade level for math. Several of our students are taking online classes to expand their learning outside our classrooms. All of these activities have a great reward for our students when they reach high school. On average, a majority of our students make honor roll or higher when they attend HUHS. Last year 75% of our students who were seniors were in the top half of their class. As a community member, this is your school. Please stop in and see it. Feel free to walk through the hallways to see what is happening within the classrooms. Attend our basketball and volleyball games or numerous activities throughout the year. Feel free to bring the family to walk our track, shoot some hoops, or play on the playground.

The school has moved to wireless mobile Chrome carts for students in $3^{rd} - 8^{th}$ grade. The school has also added two wireless carts of laptop computers for middle school and the library computer lab for students. The main computer lab has also received new desktop units for all students to use. The school is also sporting SMART Board technology in each of the classrooms, library, and computer lab. The school is also blessed with new iPads from a technology grant. On top of this, our students continue to bring their own devices to learn. The 2014-15 school budget was presented at the Budget Meeting and approved at the Annual Meeting which was held on Monday, September 22, 2014. The Erin School District has made every effort to maintain a safe and positive school environment for its students, staff and community while remaining fiscally responsible to the School District taxpayers. While the District continues to provide services as it has in the past, it can sometimes be a bit challenging. The District monitors the revenues and expenditures monthly and adjusts accordingly throughout the year. New this school year, the District has begun a morning care program for students who need care prior to the start of the school day. Students can be dropped off at school any time after 6:15 AM. We continue to offer after-school day care which is available to both current students and any community families needing child care after school. The care is available until 6:00 PM Monday through Friday. In addition to the before- and after-school care, we offer an Extended Day program for our 4-year-old kindergarten students who need to have care in the mornings before afternoon classes. These programs are self-sufficient and not funded by District funds. More information on the programs can be obtained from the District office.

Curriculum

In past newsletters we have highlighted high levels of learning, particularly in Math and English Language Arts. As a District, we continue to make great strides in this area. We have many indicators of success. One way we measure our student learning in-district is by using fall and spring Measures of Academic Progress (MAP®) assessments. This computerized test allows us to compare our students against their own growth and the scores of other students throughout the nation. Erin students continue to compete at high levels. Wisconsin also uses the School Report Card. We are happy to report that Erin School ranks as one of the highest in Washington County. At the state level, we scored in the category of Exceeds Expectations. All of these are indicators that we are preparing our students for future academic success.



In addition to academics, our teachers strive to help our students build strong character and develop life-long skills for success. This year our school-wide theme is *Growing Our Potential: Everyone's a Leader.* As part of this theme, our middle school students partner with elementary buddies. Together, they learn and model monthly themes. Some of our themes for the year include: *Respect Others, Show Responsible Behavior, Communicate Clearly, Encourage Others, Be Trustworthy* and *Solve Problems.* Strong academic successes along with opportunities to build strong character make Erin School a school of choice.



Washington County Humane Society

The Washington County Humane Society ("WCHS") is nestled on two acres next to the Polk Town Hall on State Road 60, between Jackson and Slinger, caring for nearly 3000 animals annually. WCHS contracts with the County for stray dog services and with 12 of 20 municipalities for stray cats. Licensing fees pay a portion of the costs WCHS incurs to provide these services, but they make up only about 10% of its budget. The Shelter relies for the remainder of its income on animal services, donations and fundraisers.

When animals enter WCHS's facility, they are immediately inoculated. Prior to being offered for adoption, all animals are medically and behaviorally assessed; all cats, dogs and rabbits are spayed and neutered. (Because WCHS has no veterinarian on staff, a visiting veterinarian performs spays/neuters, and several vets in the area provide low-cost services.) All dogs and cats are microchipped prior to leaving the Shelter, and WCHS provides follow-up and support for all adopters.

WCHS is fortunate in not having to euthanize for space – animals are euthanized only for aggression and serious, non-treatable illnesses. Because of its high adoption success, WCHS is able to routinely accept dogs from other crowded Wisconsin shelters. Dogs at WCHS are taken outside three times a day and enjoy long walks with Best Foot Forward volunteers. Volunteers provide lots of socialization, exercise and attention, and dog play groups in WCHS's courtyard or training facility are a common sight. WCHS's Canine Behavior Specialist works with individual dogs and trains staff in behavior modification techniques.

The cat population in Washington County continues to be a concern. WCHS provides incoming cats with places to hide and perch, depending on personality. Once moved to the adoption floor, they reside in communal rooms, cages or individual "condos." WCHS's Feline Intervention Program volunteers provide the kitties with individual grooming, playing and cuddling. Two additional programs address the County's serious cat over-population. WCHS has a Trap/ Neuter/Release program for feral cats and educates cities and villages about the benefits of TNR. Additionally, the Shelter offers a low-cost spay/neuter program (Barn Buddies) for outdoor barn cats. Both services have been extremely well-received by county residents. Whenever possible, we offer these services to out-of-county residents.

Community outreach plays an important part in WCHS's mission. The humane educator visits schools and daycares, and groups often visit the Shelter for birthday parties and tours. Each summer WCHS offers Romp with the Animals, a program designed to promote responsible attitudes and behavior toward animals and the environment. WCHS also presents to civic organizations and offers nursing homes and hospitals its Pet-A-Pet Therapy Program. Perhaps its most valuable service is its Safe Pets/Safe People program through which WCHS shelters the companion animals of abuse victims until they are in a safe environment.

The Washington County Humane Society recently celebrated its 46th anniversary. While it has accomplished much over the years and is proud of its cooperative relationships with shelters around the state, much work remains to be done. To that end, WCHS is evaluating its current space needs to better serve the County.

Highway J Citizens Group


On May 20, 2014, the Highway J Citizens Group (HJCG) organized over 200 area residents to attend a town hall meeting in West Allis that was sponsored by the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT). At this meeting, Secretary Mark Gottlieb informed the audience that the WisDOT is currently seeking substantial increases in state gas taxes and vehicle registration fees to obtain an additional \$680 million from taxpayers (beyond its current \$3 billion budget) for more highway-widening projects throughout Wisconsin.

In response, HJCG members told Secretary Gottlieb that instead of raising taxes and fees, the WisDOT should immediately cancel all wasteful and unnecessary highway-widening projects, adopt other more cost-effective, community-friendly and safety-enhancing options, and return the many millions in saved tax dollars to local communities for their road repair and maintenance needs. For example, cancelling the currently-proposed version of the Highway 164 widening project and implementing a proven-effective, 45 mph speed limit instead would save taxpayers over \$16 million (which then could be returned to local communities like Erin for road repair and additional property tax relief).

After this town hall meeting, several articles appeared in state and local news publications in which HJCG members strongly urged our state legislators to flatly reject the WisDOT's proposed gas tax and vehicle registration fee increases during the upcoming 2015-2016 legislative session.
