Help Wanted—Poll Workers

At the end of 2015, the Town Board will be appointing poll workers for the 2016 – 2017 term. With the upcoming Presidential Election in 2016, the Town is in need of additional poll workers. Poll workers must be available during the day for training, working at elections, and (after the election) to reconvene to count late-arriving absentee ballots. Election days start at 6:30 AM and end sometime around 9:30 PM (or whenever the paperwork is done). There are three to four elections in the even years, and one or two elections in the odd years.

Voter Registration

Elections are done for 2015, but keep in mind if you need to *register* to vote, that can be done at any time.

If you have turned age 18, moved into the Town of Erin more than 28 days ago, changed your name, or even moved from one address in Erin to another address in Erin, you need to register to vote.

To register you can do one of the following: Go to "My Vote Wisconsin" on the Internet, download Form GAB-131 from the Wisconsin Government Accountability website, or come into the Clerk's Office. Please remember that when using "My Vote Wisconsin," you still must print off the form and mail it in along with a proof of residency. If you downloaded a Form GAB-131, you must also mail it in with a proof of residency. A proof of residency is required no matter when you register to vote.

Also keep in mind closed registration always starts 20 days before an election. To register within 20 days of an election, you need to register in person at the Clerk's office.

I noticed at the April election some residents, already registered, thought they had to register again. Once you are registered in Erin, as long as your name or address does not change, you do not need to re-register. If your name is not in the poll book, you most likely haven't voted in four years. Following a November election, the Government Accountability Board will mail out confirmation cards to voters who have not voted in four years. If they are not returned to the clerk of the municipality, the voter is marked inactive. Inactive voters will not appear in the poll book and the voter must register again.

If you have any questions regarding voter registration, feel free to call or email the Clerk.

35th Annual St. Patrick's Day Parade

Emergency Government Bradley Bautz, Director

I have a busy foreseeable future coming up in Emergency Management. I will be updating our Emergency Operations Plan. With the U.S. Open coming up in 2017, it will be important to have that ready. There will be a lot of planning involved, and I will be helping to make this important event safe for everyone. I have also been gathering information and costs for a generator at the Town Hall and/or Erin School. The Town Hall is our emergency operations center and needs a constant supply of electricity. The reason for the school is it is our emergency shelter. The Executive Committee would make any recommendation to the Board as part of our normal budget process.



To that end, I attended a two-day FEMA class on Special Event Planning. There was an Erin Hills representative, along with a number of supervisors from the Sheriff's Office and State Patrol. It was educational and will definitely help in the planning process. There will be a lot of work to do, and we will likely need some new Town ordinances in place to make sure both the residents and the guests have an enjoyable time.

The PGA Championship will be at Whistling Straits this August, and I am making plans on attending and spending a day with their EM officials.

I am also the Town's representative on the County's hazard mitigation planning team. This is made up of representatives from all the municipalities in the county. SEWRPC is assisting the County in developing the plan. The goal is to come up with a County-wide hazard mitigation plan. This is to reduce the long-term risk to life and property due to hazards. Such things may include floodwalls, elevating homes/businesses out of floodplains, or acquiring land and demolishing structures in repeated flood-prone areas. There will be public meetings and input sessions, and they are



anticipating adoption by the County Board in early 2017.

With severe weather always a possibility, I wanted to take the opportunity to remind you about severe weather watches and warnings. A *Severe Thunderstorm Watch* means that conditions are favorable for the formation of severe storms, with damaging winds, dangerous lightning, and large hail. A *Severe Thunderstorm Warning* means these

conditions are occurring. A *Tornado Watch* means conditions are favorable for the formation of tornadoes. A *Tornado Warning* means a funnel cloud was sighted or a tornado has touched down: **TAKE SHELTER IMMEDIATELY**. Go to the lowest level of your home or building, and stay away from windows. A weather alert radio would be an excellent way to help protect yourself and your family. They can be purchased at many electronic stores. You can also receive weather warnings on your smartphone. There is no need to sign up; as long as your phone is WEA (Wireless Emergency Alerts) capable, you will receive them, and they are free.

Reminder

I encourage you to make use of the brush drop-off at the Town's dump site or recycle.

Please be cognizant of conditions before you burn. We had several grass fires this spring, and they were preventable. Your fire **must be attended at all times**. You must be near the fire. You cannot burn during a burning ban. Do not burn if the windspeed is greater than 9 miles per hour. Violations will likely result in a citation from the Town. The rules for burning are set forth below.

- No burning permits are required.
- When fire danger is very high or severe, all outdoor burning will be banned (this includes fireworks) by order of the Emergency Management Director or Town Chairman. Outdoor cooking (i.e., grills) is an exemption. For such a ban, I will notify the Sheriff's Office and local radio stations. Notices will also be found on the Town posting boards and on the website.

At any time of year:

- Open fires must be attended.
- The jurisdictional fire department, or preferably the Washington County Sheriff's Office, must be notified of any bonfire in excess of 10 feet in diameter or if a large area of grass is burned (i.e., over ¼ acre).
- Fires can't be started on the roadway surface, and only leaves and grass can be burned in the right-of-way.
- The burning of garbage, plastics, rubber, treated wood, petroleum products or anything that emits noxious or toxic odors is PROHIBITED. The DNR already bans the burning of these items, as they pose a health hazard to residents if burned.

To be eligible, you must be a resident or former resident of the Town of Erin and also have a copy of DD-214, Honorable Discharge, or deployment orders by the Federal Government documenting your military history.

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2015 ERIN PARK BOARD SUMMER UPDATE

The trees are budding out and the flowers are blooming. The growing months have made our Park a beautiful place to visit. The Soccer and Baseball Clubs are holding practices and playing games. The disc golf course continues to draw in



more and more golfers playing our well laid out course and taking in the scenery. The Park is alive with activity.

The Park Board has made some significant changes this spring. In an effort to decrease the amount of time mowing the Park and increase the productivity of the Park employees, the Town has purchased two new zero-turn mowers. Zero-turn mowers cut faster and maneuver more accurately around park obstacles. Jeff Nienhaus and the Parks crew have already started the mowing season and the 30 turf looks fantastic. We also cleaned up the Park picnic tables and replaced those that were unsafe or difficult to maintain. Tim Zignego, Town Supervisor, has been instrumental in acquiring the mowers and picnic tables, and we appreciate his efforts to communicate between the Park and Town Boards. Lastly, the finishing touches have been made to the restructuring of the south baseball field. Drainage has been improved and the over-seeding has been completed.

Other Park projects considered for this year include: Reviewing the playground equipment, sourcing power to the scoreboards and surrounding areas, rebuilding the split rail fences, providing a summer facelift for the flower beds around the park, and other miscellaneous maintenance projects.

As you know, the Park Board is made up of "hands-on" volunteers who work on the Board as well as in the parks. We are always looking for new Park project ideas and are willing to help organize a community project around a great idea. Come on down to our Park and enjoy the walking trails or a baseball game, or bring a picnic lunch up to the Gazebo this summer.

One of the biggest reasons given for relinquishing pets to WCHS is that the pet owner is moving. When looking for a place that will take your animals, be prepared to spend time demonstrating you are a responsible pet owner and good tenant by developing a "Pet Resume." Try to address the following areas in your Pet Resume:

- Mention anything about your pet's age, activity level and/or breed traits that help make your dog or cat a "good tenant." Emphasize characteristics that make your pet suited for city living. Tell the landlord something special about your companion animal's personality.
- Provide examples of your pet's good behavior. Has your dog been to obedience school or had special training? If your dog has lived in an apartment before and is accustomed to it, be sure to say so. If you have more than one cat, let the landlord know how well your pets get along and keep each other company while you are away. If your cat uses a scratching

post, say so, and note that your cat is litterbox trained.

- Provide proof that your dog or cat is spayed or neutered and explain that this makes for a well-behaved, healthier pet. Also note that your animal is up-to-date on his/her inoculations and mention who your pet's veterinarian is.
- If your pet is quiet, calm and/or less active, point that out. If you have an active dog, explain how you fulfill his/her exercise requirements. Impress upon the potential landlord that cleaning up after your dog is part of your daily routine.
- Describe your arrangements for your pet when you go to work or on vacations.

Let the property owner know that you are willing to sign a pet agreement and pay an additional pet deposit. Finally, encourage the prospective landlord to meet your pet.

HIGHWAY J CITIZENS' GROUP

On March 20, 2015, several Highway J Citizens Group (HJCG) members testified at a public hearing on the proposed 2015-17 state budget, held by the Wisconsin Legislature's Joint Committee on Finance in Milwaukee.

At this public hearing, the HJCG urged these State legislators to vote against any tax, fee or debt increases related to the Wisconsin Department of Transportation's (WisDOT) budget and then fully support the following "common sense conservative" solutions:

- Cancel all wasteful and unnecessary highway widening projects throughout the state (especially the Highway 164 widening project near the Town of Erin)
- Implement other more cost-effective, community-friendly and safety-enhancing options (like reducing Highway 164's speed limit to 45 mph, costing only \$8,000)
- Redirect the many millions in tax savings from cancelling these wasteful projects to our towns, villages and cities for local road repair and maintenance (thereby providing additional property tax relief) and . . .

• Insist upon an independent audit of the WisDOT's spending practices and a complete restructuring of this State agency.

On April 10, 2015, the WisDOT approved its latest version of the Highway 164 widening project which would:

- Cost nearly \$20 million to build
- Destroy historic homes and approximately 50 acres of farmland, wetlands and other natural areas
- Bring additional unwanted traffic into our area
- Violate two federal court decisions recently won by the HJCG to prevent the widening of this roadway.

HJCG attorneys now plan to pursue further federal court litigation against the WisDOT so that the widening of Highway 164 can be stopped -- again.

ST. PATRICK'S PRESERVATION

We are grateful to Annysa Johnson of the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel for her beautiful article regarding our Annual St. Patrick's Day Mass on March 17, 2015.

Erin — Nearly every year for more than a century, Catholics in and around this rural town have gathered at this small church on St. Patrick's Day to invoke the lessons and blessings of the patron saint of Ireland. Many feared the tradition might die in 1999 when the church closed its doors and the congregation merged with St. Kilian in nearby Hartford. Or again last year, when the Rev. David La Plante of St. Kilian was too ill to preside at the annual Mass.

But La Plante and the faithful returned to the former St. Patrick Church again on Tuesday to celebrate the Eucharist and reflect on the missionary zeal of its fifth century namesake — at a time when all Catholics are being called to newly evangelize the faith.

"We use it as a celebration of the Irish," said La Plante, who called on worshippers to emulate St. Patrick's spirit of charity and mercy.

"But the mission is to the whole world. This mission of mercy and charity has to go out to everyone."

The annual Mass offers a prayerful alternative — or perhaps prelude — to the more raucous traditions of a holiday better known for free-flowing green beer than spiritual reflection. This year, about 200 worshippers filled the pews, many donning green attire or the woolen sweaters of the Aran Isles, with more than a few red heads in the mix.

"This is such a blessing, a miracle," said Maureen Fitzsimmons-Vanden Heuvel, who had moved to the area years ago because of the church.

Fitzsimmons-Vanden Heuvel, like many of the longtime members, was devastated when the church closed. And like many, she returned to revel in the memories of marriages and baptisms, and the rhythms of life in this rural church that had been the center of a community for nearly 150 years.

"There's just so much history and tradition and love for this church," she said.

'Irish in spirit'

Built in 1855 by Irish immigrants, many of whom are now buried in its cemeteries, St. Patrick's is one of the few churches in Wisconsin built in the shape of a cross, according to the nonprofit organization founded to ensure its preservation. An imposing statute of its patron saint flanks the altar in a testament to its history.
