Presidential Preference/Spring Election Date: Tuesday, April 5, 2016

Please bring your Voter ID along. For approved forms of Voter ID see www.bringit.wi.gov

If you need to register to vote, please bring your proof of residency along. See the www.gab.wi.gov/ website for the list of approved Proof of Residency.

Absentee ballots that are to be mailed to voter: Must be requested in writing and be accompanied by a <u>copy</u> of your Voter ID unless you are an indefinitely confined voter, active military voter, or permanent oversees voter.

Absentee ballots, voted in the clerk's office: Must also show your Voter ID.

Please remember you must be a registered voter in the Town of Erin to receive an absentee ballot. If you moved or have a name change since the last election you must reregister. If you need to register to vote, to save time on Election Day, you may do it in the clerk's office up to the Friday before the election. You can register by mail up to 20 days before the election but must include a copy of your proof of residency.

New in 2016 will be a new election machine. Please be patient as it is also new to the Election workers.

PLAN COMMISSION NOTES

Sean McMullin has resigned as Plan Commission member. I want to thank him for all the time and help he provided to the Town. We are in the process of looking for a person to fill Sean's position. Please contact the Clerk if you are interested.

The Plan Commission and Town staff are starting the process of planning and permitting for the 2017 U.S. Open. We are working with Erin Hills to make this event as successful as possible. Part of that involves making sure that the Town does not incur unnecessary costs. We are working with the organizers to assure that all additional permitting costs will be paid by the organizers and there will be no cost to the Town taxpayers.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Chairman and Executive Report

We have elections for two Town Board Supervisors this Spring. Details and dates are available through our Town Clerk.

The Town Board, with the approval of the Town electors at our annual meeting, approved more funding for our roads for next year. The exact roads to be worked on will not be known until this Spring when the Roads Committee makes those decisions. We try to get to those most in need, but limited funds and coordination with other municipalities can delay specific projects.

The Town has been operating without a Park Board for the last several months. Maureen Fitzsimmons-VandenHeuvel has filled the position of Park Superintendent and has done a very good job. The Town and Executive Committee will be looking at the future structure for that Department, including whether a Park Board is needed at this time. That review will also include an update of the Park regulations, trying to clarify some of the areas, including Park hours.

The Town will also be discussing our insurance needs and reviewing some proposals to keep our insurance costs as low as possible and still cover our property.

Emergency Government

I have had a few meetings already to start the planning process for the U.S. Open that will take place at Erin Hills in June 2017. They have included other Town staff and officials, along with Erin Hills representatives, USGA officials, and the Sheriff. We are in the preliminary stages, but I will be very involved in the emergency operations planning and approving the overall plan of operations for the event, as I am also a member of the Town Plan Commission.

I will also still be doing the regular operations of the Town's emergency management. This will be a huge event, not only in terms of number of visitors to the Town, but also for the intense media coverage that will come with it. Some additional Town ordinances may be needed, which I will research, and if necessary, present to the Board. Have a safe and happy summer.

Park Report

To all of our Frisbee Golf enthusiasts: I am sure you are now aware that the Hole 3 golf receptacle is missing. We had a theft in early October, which was reported to the Washington County Sheriff's Dept. A new golf receptacle has been purchased and is awaiting installation as soon as warmer weather arrives. I want to thank Todd Kozlencer for all his help in ordering the replacement basket. Todd has also graciously offered to oversee the installation.

Tree pruning and landscape bed clean-up continued during the fall and now into winter, thanks to Rob Goetz. We had a fall weed-and-feed done in the Park and on soccer and baseball fields at the end of the soccer season. We also had aeration done on the baseball and soccer fields this past fall as well. The park and fields should be in great shape come spring.

Upcoming projects include repainting the outside of the Town Hall and making a decision on the best way to repair and maintain the Town parking lot.

It was great to see so many adults and kids utilizing the Erin Park sledding hill after our first major snowfall in late December!

Town Brush Pit

The Brush Pit is open the months of April through November on the second Saturday of each month from 8 AM to 12:00 Noon. The hours are limited due to the additional responsibilities of the highway department for road maintenance and construction. Please keep in mind that only brush – not scrap lumber, piles of leaves or any other type of rubbish – is acceptable...

Tires & White Goods Recycling




JACK RUSSELL MEMORIAL LIBRARY

The Jack Russell Memorial Library at 100 Park Avenue in downtown Hartford invites all Erin residents to visit the Library to check out the variety of materials and programs that are available to patrons of all ages. The Library is open Monday through Thursday from 10:00 AM to 8:00 PM, Fridays from 10:00 AM to 5:30 PM, and on Saturdays from 9:00 AM until 2:00 PM. Library cards are issued free of charge to Erin residents by providing a photo ID and current address.

The Youth Library has an exciting line-up of programs for this spring and is continuing a program called Parachute Play, a story time geared just for active toddlers (ages 18 months – 3 years)! Toddlers can learn through parachute play to stories and songs. Registration is required and is limited to 10 children per session. Toddler Time resumed on Thursday, January 28 at 10:30 AM and Preschool Storytime is back on Tuesday mornings at 10:30 AM and Wednesday afternoons at 1:00 PM. 
Roads Report

Spring is around the corner. Erin road crews will be patching holes, cutting brush, chip sealing roads, and performing major road rebuilding throughout the summer.

For the safety of the drivers on Erin town roads, visual and physical barriers placed in the road right-of-way should be avoided. Most roads in the Town of Erin have a 66 foot right-of-way, typically measured 33 feet from the center of the road. Planting trees or shrubbery or placing other non-moveable objects in the right-of-way is not allowed.

When driving down town roads, please be careful of town construction crews.

4K and 5K Registration

4K and 5K registration is now taking place. Open Enrollment –February I thru April 29, 2016 The Open Enrollment Program allows parents to apply for their children to attend school districts other than the one in which they live. Students in 5-year-old Kindergarten to grade 12 may apply to participate in open enrollment. Open Enrollment for 4-year-old Kindergarten and Early Childhood Education is limited. Please contact Donna Runte to find out if your preschool-aged children qualify for Open Enrollment.

How and when parents may apply?

The Open Enrollment application period for the 2016-17 school year is from February 1 through April 29, 2016. *Late applications will not be accepted for any reason.*

At Erin School it is our goal to prepare students for success in high school and beyond. We provide rigorous academic experiences that help our students achieve excellence. Our teachers continue to focus on reading, writing and critical thinking using *The Reading and Writing Workshop Framework* developed by Lucy Calkins. We are currently in our third year of implementation using the Dana Center curriculum model for mathematics. Our teachers continue to grow their math knowledge through work with a math coach and by attending professional summer learning opportunities. This year we are also reviewing Next Generation Science Standards and our instructional resources.

In addition, our teachers work hard to bring student learning to life through projects and special opportunities. Our 3rd Grade teachers are hosting a wax museum on February 26th. Each student researches and embodies a special person in history. During the evening of February 26th, our 8th Grade students are hosted a History Fair. This encompassed learning goals in science, social studies and English Language Arts. The students followed the National History Day 2016 theme of *Exploration*, *Encounter & Exchange in History*. In addition, dance, art and music throughout History were highlighted as well. We welcomed many families and community members to these events to witness our learning "on display."

We are also grateful for our Community partners who again provided fitness opportunities during our indoor Fitness Friday on February 19, 2016. Thanks also to the Schauer Arts Center for allowing Erin School to host our holiday performance in such an authentic theater setting. After our full middle school performance, our 8th Grade students performed *Holiday Hoedown*, a musical the students have been preparing since September. WASHINGTON COUNTY HUMANE SOCIETY RUNNING WITH ROVER

Exercising with your dog is an excellent way for you to keep in shape yourself ... and it can result in a wellbehaved and happy canine companion. However, before you engage in a strenuous exercise program for you and your dog, it's important to keep the following in mind:

- Be sure to have your dog seen by a veterinarian to ensure he is healthy and does not have any medical problems.
- Start with regular walks, and slowly increase the pace and distance to build up your dog's stamina.
- Jog on grass, dirt or sandy surfaces whenever possible. Your dog's paw pads can be cut or abraded by concrete and asphalt.

- Don't jog immediately after your dog has eaten or has drunk a lot of water. Some dogs can develop bloat, a life-threatening condition.
- Be aware of weather conditions, and signs of heat exhaustion in your pet. Paved surfaces get hot in warm weather, and in winter, ice-removing salt and chemicals can hurt your dog's paws.
- After your jog is over, check your dog's feet for injuries to the paws, pads and nails. Watch for lameness and soreness the next day, and if you see signs of injury or illness, see a veterinarian immediately.

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
SCHAUER ARTS CENTER
