Clerk's Corner by Julie Kriewaldt, Town Clerk

#### General Election

The General Election will be held on November 6, 2018 at the Erin Town Hall. The polling place is open 7:00 AM to 8:00 PM. This will be the biggest election of the year so be ready for longer lines when voting. In-person absentee voting begins October 22, 2018 and ends Friday November 2, 2018, Mondays – Thursdays 8:00 AM to 4:00 PM and Friday November 2, 2018 12:00 PM to 5:00 PM.

Remember, if you moved and have lived at your present address at least 10 days or changed your name -- YOU MUST RE-REGISTER before you vote. There are four ways to re-register:

- 1) If you updated your driver's license with the Department of Motor Vehicles you can re-register at myvote.wi.gov. If you choose to do this on-line you must do it at least 20 days before an election
- 2) You can fill out a registration form and mail it into the clerk but MUST include a proof of residency (at least 20 days before an election)
- 3) You can come into the Clerk's office with your proof of residency to re-register
- 4) You can also re-register on Election day with a poll worker (don't forget to bring your proof of residency). See you November 6, 2018!

#### Tax bills

The tax bills should be available by mid-December. This year the County switched to a new tax program. We will also be working with a new dog licensing program. Please be patient as we switch over to these programs. The tax-paying rules are still the same. The Town can accept tax payments up to January 31, 2019 and the checks should be made out to "Town of Erin". Tax payments made after January 31, 2019 should be made out to Washington County Treasurer and mailed to Washington County Treasurer, Room 2053, 432 E. Washington Street, West Bend, WI 53095-7986.

#### Christmas Tree Drop-off

The Town of Erin will again have the Christmas Tree drop-off (we do not pick

## Town Chairman and Plan Report by Dennis Kenealy

There is not much to report at this time. Things have been running smoothly this summer. The Plan Commission continues to meet regularly due to numerous building requests. There has been a lot of activity in the Town particularly as to requests to build accessory structures.

The Executive Committee and the Town Board will begin the budget process in October. We have not had any unforeseen large expenses so the anticipation is for a normal budget as to income and expenses.

The Town has proceeded with Plans to remove the house on Town property commonly known as part of the Horseshoe bar complex. That will provide more area for potential park use.

### Roads Report by Patti Weix

When will my road be fixed?
One of the most frequently asked questions is "when

will my road be fixed?" The Town maintains 56 miles of road and we have an annual schedule for road repair. Last year the Town spent approximately \$390,000 for new roads, crack and pothole filling, maintaining ditches and shoulders. This allows us to reconstruct approximately 1 mile of road each year. That amounts to less than 2% of the total roads in Erin. It's clear that we have a very limited budget to meet the needed road improvement demands.

Ideally the Town should be spending approximately \$740,000 per year to pave all the roads within 30 years. This is almost double what we currently spend. Why 30 years? 30 years is considered the best management practice to maintain good, safe road conditions. At the Town's present rate we're on-track to pave our roads once every 56 years!

We're sharing this information to put the Town road repair situation in perspective. Every dollar spent on repairing a road must count toward the long term use of the road. Repairing a road for long-term use requires proper preparation. To insure the roads will last nearly a lifetime means clearing the road right-of-way to remove trees, brush and rocks. Removing the excess overhang to allow for new growth over the life of the road also prevents damage to the road caused by excess shading. To resolve problems caused by standing water, shoulder repair, ditches, and culverts must also be done before repaving a road. Clear shoulders and visibility corners must be maintained for safe passage for cars, trucks, buses, RVs and delivery vehicles, pedestrians and bicycles.

We appreciate your understanding as we work through the process of making your road safe and in good condition. Please feel free to contact the Town if you have questions and concerns about your road.

### Emergency Management by Brad Bautz

Work began the week of September 10<sup>th</sup> to replace the bridge on County Highway Q over



the Oconomowoc River in Monches. The bridge was

last updated in 1980, and it dates back to 1921, making it the oldest bridge in Waukesha County. As part of the reconstruction, the dry hydrant that the town installed in 2001 must be removed, reconstructed and replaced. The hydrant is used to pump water from the river for use during fires. Waukesha County has jurisdiction over that section of roadway and is replacing the bridge.

I am in the process of developing the budget for next year. Most likely, our costs to the fire departments will go up. I am also looking at replacing the AED at the town hall, as it is old, is no longer supported by the manufacturer, has eclipsed its lifespan, and the expensive battery is about due to be replaced.

The town is a member of the Lake Country Municipal Court. This court is where our municipal citations are heard. It is located on the second floor of city hall in Oconomowoc, above the police department. Every municipality has a representative on the court's administrative committee. The committee recently voted to move the court to the location of the new

police department in Oconomowoc. This came after the city advised that the court could no longer stay at its current location. It will likely be a year or more before the court will move.

Please follow the burning ordinance. Please be cognizant of conditions before you burn. Your fire **must be attended at all times**. You must be near the fire. You cannot burn during a burning ban. Do not burn if the wind speed is greater than 9 miles per hour. Violations can result in a citation from the town. The rules for burning are set forth below.

#### No burning permits are required

When fire danger is high, very high, or severe, all outdoor burning will be banned (this includes fireworks, which are already restricted by county ordinance) by order of the emergency management director, or town chairman. Outdoor cooking (i.e. grills) is an exemption. For such a ban I will notify the sheriff's office, and local

radio stations. Notices will also be found on the town posting boards, and on the website.

At any time of year:

Open fires must be attended at all times

The jurisdictional fire department or preferably the Washington County Sheriff's Office must be notified of any bonfire in excess of 10 ft in diameter or if a large area of grass is burned (i.e. over 1/4 acre).

Fires can't be started on the roadway surface and only leaves and grass can be burned in the right-of-way.

The burning of garbage, plastics, rubber, treated wood, petroleum products or anything that emits noxious or toxic odors is PROHIBITED. The DNR already bans the burning of these items as they pose a health hazard to residents if burned. DNR regulations also prohibit businesses from disposing of solid waste by burning.

The town does not regulate the discharge of firearms, so all regular state statutes and DNR regulations apply. Rifle hunting is allowed.

Have a safe and happy fall hunting season.

### Hartford Union High School

Focus on safety is a priority at Hartford Union High School. The tragic events at schools across the country have increased the need to continually improve our safety measures for students, staff, and anyone who enters our facilities. Through a thorough building safety and threat assessment, HUHS has made, and will continue to make, major improvements.

ALiCE Training Staff received this non-sequential, non-linear approach to a threat. It stands for Alert, Lockdown + Barricade, Inform, Counter, Evacuation. This approach trains everyone to develop options if a threat is imminent or occurs.

School Resource Officers (SRO) One 12 month officer and one nine month officer are on school grounds and in the building all day. The SROs are committed to getting to know students and forming positive relationships with them through their presence, both informally and in formal settings.

Tom Conrad has been with the Hartford Police Department for 25 years as a police detective and a member of the Washington County Multi-Jurisdictional Drug Unit. Currently, Officer Conrad is one of the department's evidence technicians.

Bob St. Onge has been a police officer for over 30 years, and with the Hartford Police Department for one year. Prior to this, he was with the City of Milwaukee Police Department.

Police Officers at Co-Curricular Events City of Hartford Police Officers will attend selected co-curricular events throughout the year. Those events have been selected jointly by our SROs and the administration.

This year we had a very smooth start to the school year for our 420 students. There is so much information to share. Here are just a few items.

This year we have seen a spike in our enrollment by 30 students. Talking with new families, it appears homes in the district are starting to turn over. It appears that many of the people buying the homes have younger children and are enrolling the children in our school. We are also having a high interest from families outside the district through open enrollment. The school board has placed limits on the number of students whom we can accept so we are able to keep the class size between 18 and 22.

The staff has stayed consistent this school year. We added a full time special education teacher in January and were able to do a job share with another one of our special education teaching positions. Many staff members continued their training over the summer in both reading and math.

The building and grounds committee continues to meet and confer to keep your school property in top shape and energy efficient. Last year, we completed many projects, which include refinishing the gym floor, upgrading the playground area, patching and seal coating parking lots, removing failing ash trees, making safety improvements to the building, as well as updating a few of the areas within the building.

In April 2019 we will be starting the replacement and updates on our heating system. We are currently working with a firm to help us map out the steps to improve the energy efficiency of our heating system,

along with other possible projects such as the building envelope overall. The firm is starting to bid out the project and beginning to choose vendors to do the work. The project should be take place during the summer of 2019 and be completed by September 2019.

In addition to having SROs at select co-curricular events, a new policy is in place: non-athletes attending HUHS athletic events will no longer be allowed to bring in backpacks, book bags, duffel bags, string bags, or oversize purses.

Student Assistants Three Student Assistant positions have been added to the staff this year. They are school year employees and are in the building and on the grounds all day, each school day. The three positions are filled by four employees, two of whom are job sharing.

Randall Abbott was in law enforcement for over 34 years. He retired as a Detective from Hartford Police Department. Until recently, Randall worked in the evidence rooms at Beaver Dam Police Department and the Dodge County

Sheriff's Office. Randall was the first HUHS SRO officer from 1992-2001.

Jonathan Anderson is currently a part-time fire-fighter with Hartford Fire & Rescue and Richfield Fire Company, starting in 2009. He began as an EMT and Fire Inspector and an Emergency Services instructor with both fire companies in 2017. Jonathan earned a Bachelor's Degree in Health and Human Performance and Occupational Health & Safety in 2014.

Eric Garretson comes to HUHS from Boucher Hyundai, where he was employed for 15 years as an auto technician. Eric coaches youth sports in the community.

Rodney Lehl is a retired Army Veteran Captain who served in Desert Storm and is a retired Hartford Police Lt. having spent 25 years in law enforcement.

Student Assistants will be monitoring entrances when they are open per WI Department of Justice (DOJ) requirement. Because the Student Assistants need to visually observe students and visitors entering the building, the open entrances and times have changed. There will be two entrances open in the mornings for students to enter. The Main Entrance will open at 6:00 AM and entrance 6 in the back of the building will open at 6:45 AM. The entrance from the student parking lot will no longer be open. Students/ visitors need to use the Main Entrance.

Windows and Door Security Film Film is being Installed to all first floor, exterior windows and doors with windows. Film is also being installed in the Secure Entry interior. The film is bullet resistant, not bulletproof. It will stop an intruder from easily entering through windows, allowing time for police and security to respond more quickly.

- Standard 3M Security Film will be used for most of our windows/doors.
- 3M Ultra800 Security Film will be used for front, side, and rear entrances.

#### Additional Mental Health Services

Professional Development for all staff on Trauma Informed Care and mental health indicators of students were completed prior to the start of the school year.

We will utilize the results of the spring 2018 Youth Behavior Risk Survey (YBRS) data to identify databased student needs and develop evidence-based supports and interventions.

We have implemented private practice, school-based mental health services inside HUHS so that students and/or parents may have ready access to these critical services. Those services are provided by Professional Services Group (PSG) and Ozaukee Community Therapies. These two agencies were selected from a group of community mental health providers who responded to our request for proposals last spring. They expressed interest in our school and both agencies working with HUHS have experience working in other school districts.

We are implementing enhanced, comprehensive threat assessment procedures and wrap-around supports.

Student and Parent Commitment to Safety is a vital part of our plan. "See Something, Say Something", is reinforced at HUHS on a daily basis though administrators, teachers, staff, posters, Counselors, School Resource Officers, and Student Assistants.

"Safety is definitely a team effort", said Dan Dobner, Hartford High School Principal, "We are fortunate to have such an experienced and dedicated team working to improve and ensure student, staff, visitor, and facility safety. The HUHS Safety Team will continue to work diligently to provide for a conducive and safe teaching/learning environment."

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




