Elections:

The Town had a tremendous turnout at the April 3, 2018 Spring Election, 42% of the registered voters voted! I would like to congratulate the elected Town Supervisors Jeffrey Millikin and Maripat Blankenheim. Also thank you Pat Landon for 18+ years of service to the Town of Erin.

I would also like to thank the poll workers. They arrive early in the morning and stay late at night to finish up all the required reports and paperwork. They do a tremendous job at each and every election.

The next election is August 14, 2018. The August Election is a Primary for the November 6th General Election. The August Primary is an election where voters may vote for candidates of one party only. Unlike the November General Election, the Partisan Primary in August is for voters to nominate who they would like to move on to the November election. It has been this way since 1905. For example, if a voter wants to vote for governor in the Republican Party; the voter cannot vote for a state representative in the Democratic Party. The election machine will reject the voter's ballot. The easiest thing to do is read all directions and in the box "Choose a Party Primary" choose the party you want to vote in. If the voter marks this, it will prevent the voter from crossing over party lines causing the election machine to reject the ballot. But keep in mind, the voter still needs to vote in each race and select candidates you wish to vote for. Just filling in the party preference box, for example "Republican" does not give all Republican candidates a vote. Also, as usual, a voter can vote just in the races they want to. Voters do not have to vote for everything. I hope this helps and we will see you at the August 14, 2018 Primary Election, open 7:00 AM to 8:00 PM.

Town Chairman Report by Dennis Kenealy

As summer follows winter, so road construction follows snow plowing. In this issue you will find details of some of the proposed summer projects. On behalf of the Town, I would like to thank Pat Landon for his years of service to the Township. It has been invaluable. Pat will remain on a few committees and thus continue to have input into Town matters. Also, we welcome Maripat Blankenheim as Pat's replacement on the Town Board. Maripat has already assumed her duties and we are looking forward to continuing the Town's business.

Roads Report by Dan Coffey

We finally moved to summer road projects. It's hard to believe we were plowing snow in the middle of April.

This year's major projects include finishing the rebuilding of Donegal Road and chip sealing about 5 miles of current roads. Chip sealing (the annoying process of covering the road with tar and small stones) is very cost effective and allows us to extend road life of existing roads.

Erin roads would love to repair all the bad roads in the Town of Erin. We have 56 miles of roads and many are in need of repair. The State of Wisconsin collects all the tax money and returns about \$117,000.00 per year to the Town for road repair. The state money is enough to rebuild only about one-half mile of road per year. We budget our major road repair as well as road maintenance from this money. Fortunately, the Town also adds resident's paid tax money to help support road repair.

Town of Erin road crews continue to work to keep road right-of-ways free of trees and brush. Road right-of-ways (typically 33 feet from the center of the road) were established more than 150 years ago when the roads were created. The right-of-ways contain fiber, gas, cable, electrical wires, and other services buried underground. Brush and trees are removed from the right-of-ways for many reasons including safety and road health. As roads are rebuilt, we attempt to clear some of the right-of-way to increase road life and safety. Please keep all plantings out of the right-of-way.

The Town of Erin is building a new salt shed. The old shed is in bad repair, too small for the current salt requirements, and is too close to the Town Hall as well. We are in the planning stages and hope to see the project begin this year.

Emergency Management by Brad Bautz



Later this summer, tentatively scheduled for an August 15, 2018 start date, the bridge over the Oconomowoc River will be replaced at County Highway Q, also known as County Line Road. The road will be completely impassible during much of the construction, and the boat launch that is used to travel up the river to Loew's Lake will also be closed. This area of highway is under the jurisdiction of Waukesha County. Both Washington and Waukesha County alternate sections of CTH Q that they maintain. I have worked extensively with Waukesha County and the private engineering firm hired for the project. The Town owns and maintains a dry hydrant for fire protection at that site. It was installed in about the year 2000. As part of the project, it needs to be removed. Working with the county, a newly designed hydrant will be built and installed by the contractor doing the bridge replacement. I felt it was very important to replace the hydrant. The Town will continue to own and maintain the new hydrant, with the Richfield Volunteer Fire Company assisting, as it is in their fire area. By partnering with Waukesha County, the project should cost \$6,370. This money will come out of the Fire/Rescue reserve account. We are able to save money and time by having this done while the bridge is replaced, instead of needing our own engineering for the hydrant, and having to install it after the county's bridge work is done. Thank you to Waukesha County for partnering with us!

TORNADO

May 9th, 2018 saw the first tornado of the year in the Milwaukee area touch down. It was rated by the National Weather Service (NWS) as an EFO, which is the lowest on the scale. There was property damage in both the Town of Erin and the Village of Richfield, but thankfully no injuries or deaths were reported. This is a map of the tornado track from the National Weather Service. It originated just west of County Highway K, in the area of Emerald Drive.



I was asked about sirens. The town does not have any tornado sirens. The closest sirens are in the City of Hartford, and there is one in Alderley, which is in the Town of Ashippun. If you live near those areas, you can likely hear them outdoors. When I looked into this several years ago, the cost/benefit did not seem to be there, as they are quite expensive to buy and install, and they must be maintained. We do not have a high population density. Sirens also must have a protocol and someone to activate them. We do not have a full time dispatch center, so we would need to rely on the sheriff's office. News broadcasts, cell phones,



and weather alert radios are all effective ways of receiving alerts as well.

With more severe weather a possibility, I want to take the opportunity to remind you about severe weather watches and warnings. A *Severe Thunderstorm Watch* means that conditions are favorable for the formation of severe storms, with damaging winds, dangerous lightening, and large hail.

A Severe Thunderstorm Warning means these conditions are occurring. A Tornado Watch means conditions are favorable for the formation of tornados. A Tornado Warning means a funnel cloud was sighted or a tornado has touched down: TAKE SHELTER IMMEDIATELY. Go to the lowest

level of your home or building, and stay away from windows. A weather alert radio would be an excellent way to help protect yourself and your family. They can be purchased at many electronics stores. You can also receive weather warnings on your smart phone. There is no need to sign up. As long as your phone is WEA



(Wireless Emergency Alerts) capable, you will receive alerts, and they are free.

Reminder

I encourage you to make use of the brush drop off at the town's dump site or recycle.

Please be cognizant of conditions before you burn. We had several grass fires this spring, and they were preventable. Your fire **must be attended at all times**. You must be near the fire. You cannot burn during a burning ban. Do not burn if the wind speed is greater than 9 miles per hour. Violations can likely result in a citation from the town. The rules for burning are set forth below.


No burning permits are required

When fire danger is high, very high, or severe all outdoor burning will be banned (this includes fireworks, which are already restricted by county ordinance) by order of the emergency management director, or town chairman. Outdoor cooking (i.e. grills) is an exemption. For such a ban I will notify the sheriff's department, and local radio stations. Notices will also be found on the town posting boards, and on the website.

At any time of year:

Open fires must be attended at all times

- The jurisdictional fire department or preferably the Washington County Sheriff's Office must be notified of any bonfire in excess of 10 ft in diameter or if a large area of grass is burned (i.e. over ¼ acre).
- Fires can't be started on the roadway surface and only leaves and grass can be burned in the right -of-way.
- The burning of garbage, plastics, rubber, treated wood, petroleum products or anything that emits noxious or toxic odors is PROHIB-ITED. The DNR already bans the burning of these items as they pose a health hazard to residents if burned.

We welcome Supervisor, Daniel Zignego, as the new Erin Park liaison and are grateful for the knowledge he will bring to the position.

Due to the colder than usual spring weather and an over abundance of rain, our crabgrass preventer and weed control was delayed until the second week of May. Schoofs GreenWorks did a great job working with us and the Erin Soccer Club.

The next big undertaking in the Park will be the construction of a new salt shed—badly needed for several years. Due to placement of the salt shed, the playground equipment on the north side of the park will have to be relocated along with at least one of the Frisbee Golf holes. Park employee, Todd Kozlencer, (designer and installer of our Frisbee Golf Course) will oversee the new design of the course and the landscaping issues that will need to be addressed after the construction is completed.

Other projects will be: removal and replacement of two of our six ash trees in late summer and addressing the large crack that has developed on the sports court.

As mentioned in our Spring 2018 issue, please, please, please be aware of the INVASIVE wild parsnip infestation in Washington County. You can educate yourself on how to eradicate this invasive species and stop the spread along our roadways and in our park. 




Erin Hills, By John Morrissett
















Jack Russell Library by Jennifer Einwalter
