Lottery Credit Qualification

The Department of Revenue did an audit of Washington County properties regarding the Wisconsin Lottery Credit property tax relief provided in 2016. There were 6 properties in Erin that received a lottery credit last year and should not have. As the Clerk, I was responsible for putting, as they call it, the failed lottery credit on 5 tax bills as special charges for the 2017 tax season, payable in 2018. The property owners have to pay that lottery credit back to the State along with penalties and interest.

Lottery credits are only for your primary residence and you have to live there on January 1st, 2017 to get a lottery credit for that tax season. This has to be your primary residence in which you live at least 6 months out of the year. It cannot be a rental property or vacation home (i.e. a lake cottage). It also cannot be manufacturing property or business property unless the owner lives on the premises (i.e. living quarters above a tavern).

If you currently get a lottery credit and your situation changes, you must contact the County Treasurer (262-335-4324) to have the credit removed. For example:

it was your primary residence, now you moved out permanently but still own the property it is now a rental property

you claim a lottery credit on another property which became your primary residence

2018 Elections

2018 will bring four elections:

February 20, 2018 Spring Primary Election

April 3, 2018 Spring Election
August 14, 2018 Fall Partisan Primary Election
November 6, 2018 Fall General Election

Information for the elections will be put on the www.erintownship.com website under the Election menu option as it becomes available.

The Spring Primary will be for a Wisconsin Supreme Court Justice. The Spring Election will include school boards, Wisconsin Supreme Court Justice, County Supervisors, two Town of Erin Town Board supervisors, and more.

August is the primary for the November election. The November election will include Wisconsin Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Secretary of State, State Treasurer and more.

Tires & White Goods Recycling Event - April 7, 2018

April 7, 2018, 8:00am – noon the Town will have their annual Tires & White Good Recycling Day. Watch the website or newspaper for more details including the disposal cost of each item. You are able to bring in old tires, stoves, refrigerators, freezers, washers, dryers, humidifiers and pay a fee to recycle them. Please do not bring in iron filters, microwaves, or any electronics as they cannot be accepted.

Dog Licensing

Each year all dogs (5 months and older) have to be licensed by March 31st. Don't forget to license your dog for 2018. The application is on the website under "Forms". To license your dog(s), we need one application filled out per dog, the license fee, and the rabies certificate (this is returned to the owner). There is a \$5 late fee if the dog is not licensed by March 31st (this does not apply to puppies not old enough to license or if you acquire a dog later in the year).

Town Chairman Report by Dennis Kenealy

There will be several changes to our Town Board. The Town will be appointing a Supervisor to take the place of Tim Zignego. I would like to thank Tim for all of his valuable services the last few years. Also there will be a spring election in which at least one new Supervisor will be elected. We have a number of interested people who are running for that position.

We continue to discuss the future of the rental house located on the Town property. At this time it is the Board's decision to vacate the property and no longer pursue a rental of that land.

Those are the major issues at this time. The budget process went smoothly and we held the line on taxes for one more year.

Plan Commission by Dennis Kenealy

The Plan Commission has been more active than we anticipated. A lot of time has been expended in handling the so called Event Barn situations. The Plan Commission has become very involved in all aspects of those decisions and it appears that will continue. Also there have been many requests for buildings and land splits, which apparently indicates a robust market in the Town of Erin.

Roads Report by Dan Coffey

Town of Erin Road History

Most of the roads in Erin were established in the year 1846 and were completed by 1855. This included the road locations

and the right-of-ways that we honor today. This is recorded in the "Washington County Highway Register". The Milwaukee Land Office opened in 1836 allowing homesteading. The road scheme was established and in place by 1855, more than 160 years ago. As we repair roads, we honor those same boundaries today.

The Road Teams' Activities

Residents may not be aware of how many times during the year storms cause the roads crew to clear downed trees and branches from our roadways in the middle of the night. We as residents sleep through the night and head out for the day, never knowing what took place the previous night. The road crew may get a call any time of day to remove trees (usually late night or early morning), sometimes with downed utility lines as well

Road repair is an ongoing process. We can only repave a small section of road each year due to lack of funding from the state and local taxes. The first step to repairing a road is to remove brush and trees from the road edge. This is important for many reasons. Removing brush and trees from the right-of—way (area typically 33' from the center-line of the road) allows the sunlight to clear ice and snow, disables tree roots from damaging the road base and asphalt, and helps avoid deer-car collisions. Please respect the road crew as they work in the right-of-way areas. Their goal is to keep residents and all vehicles that use the roads as safe as possible.

This year's agenda for road repair includes applying several miles of chip sealing (yes it is that annoying tar with small stones). Chip Seal will be put on existing roads to fill the cracks and give the road an extra layer of protection. Please drive slowly for the first week after the chip seal process to avoid damage from the loose stones to your vehicle and the vehicles you meet. The Roads team will also be finishing the last stretch of Donegal road between Carmel Drive and Emerald Drive. We may also be removing brush and trees from the right-of-ways on Emerald Drive in preparation for that road's repair in the future.

Town Board Road Activities

The Town of Erin Board members are looking at replacing the salt shed. The existing shed has rotted posts that would need to be replaced. Board members have looked at repairing the shed but it is cheaper to build new. The current shed holds half the salt needed for a single year, it is too close to the Town's well and it doesn't conform to today's standards. We will have to conform to the current DNR standards when we build the new salt shed.

Emergency Management by Brad Bautz

As I write this article, the town has not declared a "Snow Emergency" this winter. Just a reminder, if the Town

Chairman or I declare one, that means no vehicles may be left parked on or along the roadway of any town maintained roads. This is done during larger snowfall total amounts. As a matter of practice during any snow event, please do not park vehicles on or along the roadway-state, county, or town. There have been some instances of parked vehicles interfering with snow removal. If a vehicle goes in the ditch, it must be removed right away. The Sheriff's Office typically has any vehicles on or along the roadway removed. They also must be removed by a licensed towing service for the safety of all. A "Snow Emergency" does NOT allow for snowmobiles, ATV's, UTV's or any other device to use the roadways. ALL state DNR regulations still apply. There are no designated "Snowmobile Routes" on any roads in the town.

The dry hydrant on the Oconomowoc River on Highway Q/County Line Road will be replaced. It is a hydrant that the town installed back in 2001 in order to pump water from the river for use during fires. Waukesha County has jurisdiction over that section of roadway and is replacing the bridge. It was last updated in 1980, and it dates to 1921, making it the oldest bridge in Waukesha County. It will be completely replaced and redone. As a result, the hydrant will need to be removed, reconstructed and replaced. This construction will take place sometime this year and the bridge will be out, making the road impassible during construction.

I had the opportunity to represent the town at the swearing in of the Richfield Volunteer Fire Company's new chief, John Schmitz. The department serves the Village of Richfield, and portions of the Towns of Erin, Germantown, and Polk. Each community had a representative there. Congratulations on your retirement Terry Kohl and thank you for your years of service. Good luck Chief Schmitz!

Please follow the burning ordinance. We have had several complaints last year involving burning. Please be cognizant of conditions before you burn. You must be near the fire. You cannot burn during a burning ban. Do not burn if the wind speed is greater than 12 miles per hour. Violations can result in a citation from the town. The rules for burning are set forth below

No burning permits are required

When fire danger is high, very high, or severe all outdoor burning will be banned (this includes fireworks, which are already restricted by county ordinance) by order of the emergency management director, or town chairman. Outdoor cooking (i.e. grills) is an exemption. For such a ban I will notify the sheriff's office, and local radio stations. Notices will also be found on the town posting boards, and on the website.

Open fires must be attended at all times

The jurisdictional fire department or preferably the

Washington County Sheriff's Office must be notified of any bonfire in excess of 10 ft in diameter or if a large area of grass is burned (i.e. over ¼ acre).

Fires can't be started on the roadway surface and only leaves and grass can be burned in the right-of-way.

The burning of garbage, plastics, rubber, treated wood, petroleum products or anything that emits noxious or toxic odors is PROHIBITED. The DNR already bans the burning of these items as they pose a health hazard to residents if burned.

DNR regulations also prohibit businesses from disposing of solid waste by burning.

Erin Park, by Maureen Fitzsimmons-Vanden Heuvel

We would like to extend a huge thank you to former Town of Erin Supervisor, Tim Zignego, the Erin Park liaison for his support and guidance for the last five years. Tim has relocated to our sister community of Richfield and we wish him all the best.

Crab grass is an ongoing problem in the park, especially on the soccer fields. Due to this fact, the decision has been made to apply crabgrass preventer and our yearly weed control in the spring when weeds are actively growing. This will entail non-use of the soccer and baseball fields for a few days during the week at the beginning of the soccer season. As always, soccer is very supportive and we are hopeful this will pay huge dividends in improving our turf in the park.

Projects for 2018 include lengthening the Frisbee Golf pads, and sealing of the gazebo, base of the scoreboards and the newly rebuilt sandbox. We added two autumn blaze maples in the fall of 2017 thanks to end-of-the-season pricing of Goetz's Nursery. We also have six ash trees that will eventually succumb to emerald ash borer disease, so plans are underway to remove and replace two ash trees for the next three years.

For those of you who are unaware, a wild parsnip infestation is an ongoing battle in Erin Park and along our roadways. Please educate yourself on how to eradicate this invasive species. Our Park budget has remained constant even though projects have increased. We are grateful to Todd Kolzencer whose expertise has, in so many areas, allowed us to save money while ensuring the continued beautification of our town park. Thanks also to Steve Leinberger who is able to help out at a moment's notice.

Looking to Serve - The

Erin School District has four standing committees where we could use some volunteers. If you are interested, please contact the school. The committees are <u>Buildings & Grounds</u>, <u>Policy/Legislation & Bylaws</u>, <u>Finance-Transportation</u>, and <u>Negotiations</u>. Also, if you live in the Erin School District and are interested in running for the Erin School Board, please contact the District Administrator for more information.

Community Outreach – The area school districts are looking to host three events for the community. While currently in the planning stages, we think the first is on February 7th with a showing of "Screenagers. Please watch the District webpage for more information or give the school a call.

Heating Plant Upgrades – After many years of reviewing and completing various projects, the Erin School Board passed a resolution on December 18, 2017. This resolution allows the Board to move forward on upgrading the current heating system for the 1958, 1965, and 1979 sections of our school (13 classrooms) along with consolidating our three (3) boiler rooms to one (1) and reduce our five (5) boilers to three (3) boilers. This is the last big project and the most expensive.

The Board has been working to save additional money over the last ten years to avoid increasing cost to taxpayers. This project will cost \$1,330,880 of which the district has committed \$828,930 over the next six years. The resolution is to levy an additional \$200,000 for each of the next three years, using an Energy Efficiency Exemption. This would result in the Erin School portion of your 2019 tax bill increasing by \$0.48 per \$1,000</u>. By way of example, a \$400,000 house would yield a \$192 tax increase per year for three years. The work for the project will begin April 2019 and be completed September 2019.

Building and Grounds, by Debra Fenney, Director of Building and Grounds

How do you fight Flu Season? With a team of custodians empowered with the resources and training needed to quickly and safely enact protocols to protect learning spaces. Over the holidays, all classroom surfaces and everything else students and teachers touch throughout the day were disinfected. Each restroom was pressure-washed with disinfecting solution as it is every other night during the school year. We have foggers ready for the classroom if the need occurs for classrooms. Keeping school buildings free of germs and infectious materials is and will always be a challenge for a maintenance department and is a significant part of caring for the health and welfare of children and teenagers in the school system. We do ask for your help in reminding the kids to keep up routine hygiene in school and at home.

Summer Projects – Over the last summer, we completed two big projects. We had the roof replaced on the 1958 and 1965 sections of the school. While we had the roofs replaced, we added more insulation to keep the building warmer during winter and cooler during the summer. The other project was a complete hallway floor update. We had the concrete polished and parts of the hallways have new carpeting installed. This update has made the maintenance much easier and cost effective.

Book Keeper by Cheryl Johrendt

As Erin is property rich, it means less General State Aid for the District. Erin School has a fiscal responsibility to their taxpayers to be sure that the valuable resources we receive are put to best use. The District's fund balance is around 41% and allows us to operate without having to borrow to meet our financial obligations. In addition, the fund balance will allow Erin School District to plan for future building projects with minimal borrowing.

In doing so, Erin has reduced its tax levy for the 2017/2018 school year. While the average tax bill is reduced, it does not mean every individual taxpayer will see a decrease. Homeowners who added an addition or enhancement to their property could potentially see an increase. The assessed value of a property will determine the amount of taxes. Continuous monitoring of the budget (revenues and expenses) has allowed Erin to provide high quality programs, appealing and updated facilities, and staff who are passionate, dedicated and committed. Your school district is committed to providing the best quality education now and into the future.

Curriculum by Joannie Kalina, Director of Curriculum & Instruction

Erin School District continues to work on teaching the curriculum and improving it to make sure our students are successful at Erin School, high school and the path they choose once they have completed high school. There are many ways we monitor our curriculum. We do local assessments in the classroom with daily check-ins by the classroom teacher. We conduct unit assessments on the information that was taught within a given time period by grade levels. We also conduct more formal assessments three times a year using the Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) test that is designed by Northwest Evaluation Association (NWEA).

The State of Wisconsin also has our students assessed in grades 3-8 in the areas of English/Language Arts and math. Students in grades 4 and 8 are also assessed in science and social studies. The State uses these results to check on how well a school district is performing in each of the areas and gives each school a report card. This year, Erin School District is ranked 11 out of 422 school districts and for the second time is the highest ranked school district in Washington County. The goal of the district is not to chase scores but to make sure what we are doing will prepare each student to be successful. Looking at all of our results, we believe we are being successful reaching our goal.

experience for the community to meet, talk, laugh and raise money for the school.





This year's St. Patrick's Day Parade is fast approaching and will be held on Saturday, March 17th, **starting at 11 AM**. It will begin again this year at the intersection of County Hwy E and County Hwy K. It will proceed south on County Hwy K to the intersection of County Hwy K and Hwy 167 where it will end.

Police will be starting to close off Hwy K to traffic around 9:30 AM. Parking along County Hwy K will be limited to passenger vehicles and light trucks. 

Heating bills a struggle? Applying for the Wisconsin Home Energy Plus program is the answer!

The WHEAP program runs from October 1, 2017 – May 15, 2018. The program offers a one-time payment per household, per heating season to assist with your utility cost.

All applicants must meet the income eligibility limits. For example, the income limit for a single person is \$2217 per month. The income limit for a couple is \$2,899 per month. The size of the benefit will depend on household size, income and heating costs.

Assistance is available whether you heat your home with wood, fuel oil, propane, natural gas or electricity. The payment generally is sent directly to the energy provider.

The WHEAP program also partners with the Weatherization Program and may be able to provide assistance if your furnace should break down during the season. This is a program available to you at NO cost.

The Weatherization Program will also offer an evaluation of your home to help you reduce your energy costs. If you chose to participate in the Weatherization Program, a representative from Weatherization will contact you to do an audit of your home. Once the audit is complete, you may be eligible for assistance in the form of air sealing, insulating and repair/replacement of mechanicals such as water heaters, furnaces and ventilation fans.

Energy Assistance appointments are offered in West Bend, Germantown, Hartford, Kewaskum and Jackson. Contact your local Home Energy Plus Agency at (262) 335-4677 for more information or to apply for assistance.


