Spring Election

The 2019 Spring Election had the highest turnout in Erin for any spring election in an odd-numbered year. There were 1,360 voters, just six fewer voters than the last presidential preference in April 2016. Our winners are Chairman Dennis Kenealy, Supervisors Dan Coffey and Daniel Zignego, and Treasurer Nicole Lipske.

Election Inspectors

At the end of every odd year the poll workers (election inspectors) are reappointed. From time to time, poll workers move, resign, or are unavailable at certain times of the year due to vacations. For those reasons, the town is always looking for more poll workers. Poll workers must be available during the day for training and working at elections. It is a fast-moving job, and following state laws is essential. Election days start at 6:30 am and end sometime after 9:30 pm, whenever necessary paperwork is finished. There are three to four elections in the even years and one or two elections in the odd years.

At smaller elections, there may only be five poll workers needed and at large elections there are at least 13 poll workers needed. There is also a need for poll workers to sub for lunches and dinners so those shifts are shorter. At large elections, poll workers are needed to assign a voter number and run absentee ballots through the election machine during the voting times. Chairman Report, by Dennis Kenealy

Congratulations to all those elected to town positions in the April election. Also, thanks to all the voters who participated by making the choice to vote. The Clerk has a note in her report, but another reminder that we keep a list of those interested in serving the town on committees and boards. If you have an interest in serving, read the clerk's report for specific information. We are in the process of updating some of our zoning ordinances to eliminate some confusion and, hopefully, make them more easily understood.

Emergency Management by Brad Bautz

The town owns and maintains a dry hydrant for fire protection at Hwy. Q and County Line Road at the



Oconomowoc River in Monches that needed to be replaced as part of the road project. The town will continue to own and maintain the new hydrant, with the Richfield Volunteer Fire Company assisting, as it is in their fire area. We were able to save money and time by having this done while the bridge was replaced, instead of needing our own engineering for the hydrant, and having to install it after the county's bridge work was done. Thanks to Waukesha County for partnering with us on this project.

This past spring, I attended training classes in conjunction with the Governor's Conference on emergency management. I'm updating our emergency plan and working on memorandums of agreement with other entities that are part of our plan.

The Executive/Emergency Management Committee and the Town Board restructured the Emergency Management Director position. Ordinance

enforcement duties were moved to another position. The town board appointed me to the Enforcement Officer position that existed in town code. The position is responsible for enforcing town ordinances. The officer also does the background checks for operator's (bartender) licenses and other functions per our town code. I also help other town officials to investigate and enforce ordinances under their jurisdiction.

While not in the town, the Hwy. 164 reconstruction project in nearby Richfield is well underway. You can follow updates at: <https://projects.511wi.gov/wis164/>

In addition to Hwy. 164 being closed to traffic from Hwy. Q/County Line Road to Hwy. E, Hwy. 167/Holy Hill Road will also be closed at Hwy. 164 starting on or around June 10 and remain closed through late August for the installation of a roundabout near Friess Lake School.

With more severe weather a possibility, I want to take the opportunity to remind you about severe weather watches and warnings. A *Severe Thunderstorm Watch* means that conditions are favorable for the formation of severe storms, with damaging winds, dangerous lightning, and large hail. A *Severe Thunderstorm Warning* means these conditions are occurring. A *Tornado Watch* means conditions are favorable for the formation of tornados. A *Tornado Warning* means a funnel cloud was sighted or a tornado has touched down: **TAKE SHELTER IMMEDIATELY.** Go to the lowest level of your home or building, and stay away from windows. A weather alert radio, which can be purchased at many electronics stores, would be an excellent way to help protect yourself and your family. You can also receive weather warnings on your smart phone. There is no need to sign up. As long as your phone is WEA (Wireless Emergency Alerts) capable, you will receive alerts, and they are free.

Reminder

I encourage you to recycle or make use of the brush drop off at the town's dump site.

Please be cognizant of conditions before you burn. Your fire **must be attended at all times.** You must be near the fire. You cannot burn during a burning ban. Do not burn if the wind speed is greater than 9 miles per hour. Violations can result in a citation from the

town. Rules for burning:

- No burning permits are required
- When fire danger is high, very high, or severe all outdoor burning will be banned (this includes fireworks, which are already restricted by county ordinance) by order of the emergency management director, or town chairman. Outdoor cooking (i.e. grills) is an exception. For such a ban I will notify the sheriff's office and local radio stations. Notices will also be found on the town posting boards and on the website.

At any time of year:

- Open fires must be attended at all times
- The jurisdictional fire department, or preferably the Washington County Sheriff's Office, must be notified of any bonfire in excess of 10 feet in diameter or if a large area of grass is to be burned (i.e. over ¼ acre).
- Fires can't be started on the roadway surface and only leaves and grass can be burned in the right-of-way.

- The burning of garbage, plastics, rubber, treated wood, petroleum products or anything that emits noxious or toxic odors is PROHIBITED. The DNR already bans the burning of these items as they pose a health hazard to residents if burned.
- The DNR also prohibits the burning of solid waste by businesses.

Please keep your address sign visible for our emergency responders, and do not move or otherwise modify them. It is a violation of town ordinances to do so. If they get damaged or need to be replaced, please contact the town clerk for a replacement.

Our local fire departments wanted me to take the opportunity to ask all residents to make sure their driveways stay clear for emergency vehicles. This is particularly important on very long driveways, or driveways that have brush, trees, or low hanging branches that get in the way. Fire apparatus keeps getting taller and taller, and fire trucks and

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ambulances need the space to avoid damaging your trees and their equipment.

Roads

Greetings Town of Erin Residents:

I'm Dan Zignego, Town of Erin Supervisor and a member of the Town Road Committee. The Road Committee oversees the maintenance and repairs of the Town roads. This includes snowplowing, mowing, tree trimming, seal coating, crack filling and asphalt overlays.

 Our roads are subjected to some of the worst weather conditions in the country. We undergo numerous freeze – thaw cycles each year, which accelerates the breakdown of our roads. This leads to cracks, bumps and potholes that must be fixed. The balancing act the Road Committee performs is to address these issues within the limited budget we are allowed by State Statute. This makes it difficult to address all of the needs each year due to limited funds.

I will share more data about our roads program, including information on our budget process and the options available to us, in a future letter.

Day Care Opening - Erin School has two (2) full time openings for toddlers (turn 2 by 9/1) but are younger than 4 years old. The toddler group will consist of a total of 6 students with their own teacher. The toddler group starts out in the infant/toddler room and will join the extended 4K students for the morning in the extended 4K room. The toddler group will eat lunch with the extended 4K students in the lunchroom and return to the infant room for nap time. The remaining part of the day will be in the infant room. If you have more questions, please give Dr. Kriewaldt a call.

Parents wanting full time day care

Staff member children

Parents/Guardians who already have a child attending Erin School

Parents who live in the Erin School District

Community members who want to attend

If there are more children than openings, a drawing and waiting list will be done as outlined in policy 423 and 423(R).

Daycare is available during school days and teacher in-service days. Hours are as follows: Monday 7:45 am to 4:45 pm, Tuesday 7:30 am to 4:15 pm, Wednesday 7:30 am to 4:00 pm, Thursday 7:30 am - 4:00 pm and Friday 7:30 am to 3:45 pm. Cost is \$5.25 per hour or \$213 per full week.

Erin School also offers childcare for our students:

- Early Morning Care – Students may be dropped off in the multi-purpose room as early as 6:15 am.
- 4K Extended Day – for parents needing their child to be here outside of the regular 4K classroom time.
- After School Care – Students can be picked up after school as late as 6:00 pm.

There is an hourly fee for these programs. Please contact the front office for more information.

If interested in childcare, please submit the following information (e-mails are OK) to Dr. Kriewaldt, kriewaldt@erinschool.org or the front office: Parents' name, child's name, child's date of birth, hours of care desired if not full time (please indicate if full time), and phone number. We will notify all the applicants of our selection by July 8, 2019.

This year the building will be under extensive construction. We will be replacing the HVAC (heating, ventilation and air conditioning) system, which includes boilers, univents, all pneumatics and existing controls. The whole building will be switched over to DDC (Direct Digital Control). Implementing these actions will optimize the heating, ventilation and air conditioning systems along with providing a substantial reduction in energy consumption. The ceiling tiles in the entire building will be replaced. The school will also start updating classroom shelving, flooring and repaving the back driveway and turnaround.

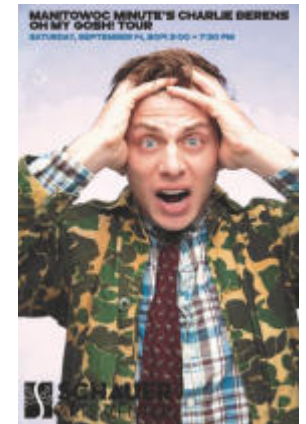

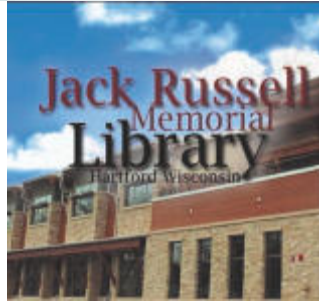

Jack Russell Memorial Library

The Jack Russell Memorial Library at 100 Park Avenue in downtown Hartford invites all Erin residents to check out the variety of materials and programs that are available to patrons of all ages. Library cards are issued free to Erin residents by providing a photo ID and current address. Children age 5 through eighth grades may obtain a card with parental approval.



Beginning July 1, the library will open Monday through Saturday at 9 am. With the support of the City of Hartford and changes within our staffing structure, we are able to add five hours per week for public service. Hours effective July 1 are Monday through Thursday 9 am-8 pm, Friday 9 am-5:30 pm and Saturday 9 am-2 pm. Until July, the library opens at 10 am. The library is closed on Sunday.

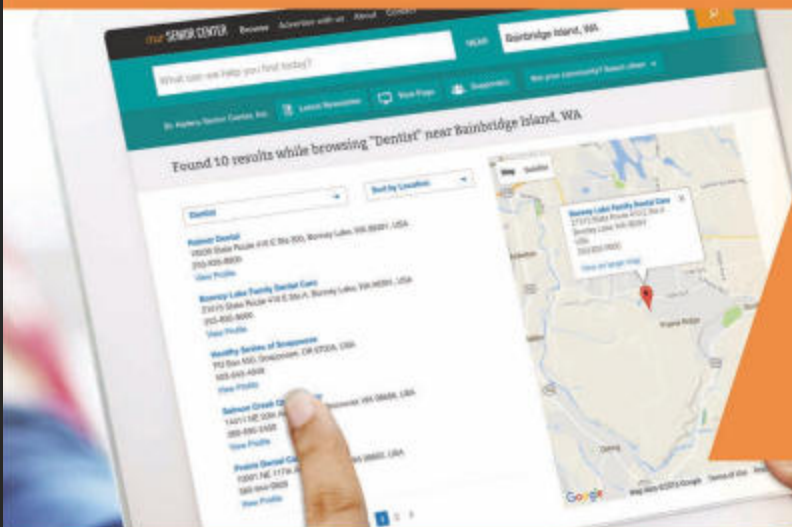
