Elections

This year brings two elections – Feb. 16 and April 6 – for local offices, school boards and state offices.

Dog licenses

All dogs five months and older are required to be annually licensed by March 31. Dog license applications are required for each dog, complete with the license fee and a copy of the rabies certificate. The certificate is returned with your license in a self-addressed stamped envelope you provide. There is a **\$5 late fee** if the dog is not licensed by March 31. This only applies to puppies that are five months old or older. Dogs acquired throughout the year may be licensed at that time.

Tax receipts

To print your tax receipt from the Washington County website:

- Go to <http://www.co.washington.wi.us>
- On the left-hand side of the main page, click **Taxes/Assessment information**. This takes you to the Washington County Ascent Land Records site.
- Click the drop-down and pick **T3-TOWN OF ERIN**.
- You can search by last name, street number or parcel ID.
- When you find your parcel, click the red **Parcel number**, which provides your parcel information.
- Choose the **Select Detail Taxes**.
- Go to the correct tax year, **2020**, and click.
- A small box will open, click **Printer Friendly**.
- Print your receipt from this screen.

Town Chairman by Dennis Kenealy

It has been a busy year. Once again, the town budget for 2021 was held to no increase. It's challenging, but the Executive Committee and Town Board thoroughly review the options so we can continue to provide all the necessary town services without raising the mill rate.

We welcome new Plan Commission members Jonathan Stueck, Andrew Pyzyk and Randy Weix.

The town is in discussion with the Washington County Sheriff's Department regarding the development of a future communications tower in the town pit property. This is preliminary and will be considered over the course of the next year by the Town Board and Plan Commission.

Discussions will be held soon regarding the St. Patrick's Day parade.

Emergency Management by Bradley Bautz, Director

As I write this article, the town has not yet declared a snow emergency this winter.



Just a reminder, if I or the Town Chairman declare one, that means no vehicles may be left parked on or along the roadway of any town-maintained roads. This is done during larger snowfall total amounts. As a matter of practice, during any snow event, do not park vehicles on or along any roadway – state, county or town. There have been times when parked vehicles interfered with snow removal. If a vehicle goes in the ditch, it should be removed immediately. They also must be removed by a licensed towing service for everyone's safety. A snow emergency does NOT allow for snowmobiles, ATVs, UTVs or any other vehicles to

use the roadways. ALL state DNR regulations still apply. There are no designated snowmobile routes, or ATV/UTV routes on any roads in the town.



I maintain the Facebook page, Town of Erin Wisconsin-Emergency Management, where I post any news releases, burning restrictions, road construction closures, and general reminders for residents.

We continue to deal with COVID-19/Coronavirus. Because things can change quickly, check the Washington/Ozaukee Health Department website for current information: www.washozwi.gov

Vaccinations started in Washington and Ozaukee Counties with health care workers and long-term care facility residents. It continues with Fire/EMS workers and law enforcement personnel. The Centers for Disease Control has a tier system that determines the order in which vaccines are given.

The health department lists infection rates by ZIP code. Because Erin has five ZIP codes – Hartford 53027, Hubertus 53033, Colgate 53017, Hartland 53029, and Oconomowoc 53066 – it's impossible to determine how many Erin residents have been infected.

Burning

Remember to follow the burning ordinance. We had several burning complaints last year. Please be cognizant of conditions before you burn. It can be especially dangerous during spring after the snow melts but before everything greens up. In November 2020, there was a large grass fire off of Erin Road that necessitated the evacuation of some homes in the area. Fourteen fire departments responded to extinguish the fire.

Your fire **must be attended at all times**. You must be near the fire. You cannot burn during a burning ban. Do not burn if the wind speed is greater than 12 miles per hour. Violations can result in a town citation.

Burning rules:

- No burning permits are required
- When fire danger is high, very high, or severe, all outdoor burning will be banned (this includes fireworks, which are already restricted by county ordinance) by order of the emergency management director, or town chairman. Outdoor cooking (such as grills) is an exemption. For such a ban, I will notify the sheriff's office, and local radio stations. Notices will also be posted on the town posting boards and on the website.


At any time of year:

- Open fires must always be attended.

- The jurisdictional fire department, or preferably the Washington County Sheriff's Office, must be notified of any bonfire in excess of 10 feet in diameter or if a large area of grass is burned, such as more than a quarter acre.
- Fires can't be started on the roadway surface, and only leaves and grass can be burned in the right-of-way.
- The burning of garbage, plastics, rubber, treated wood, petroleum products or anything that emits noxious or toxic odors is **PROHIBITED**. The DNR bans the burning of these items as they pose a health hazard to residents if burned.
- DNR regulations prohibit businesses from disposing of solid waste by burning.

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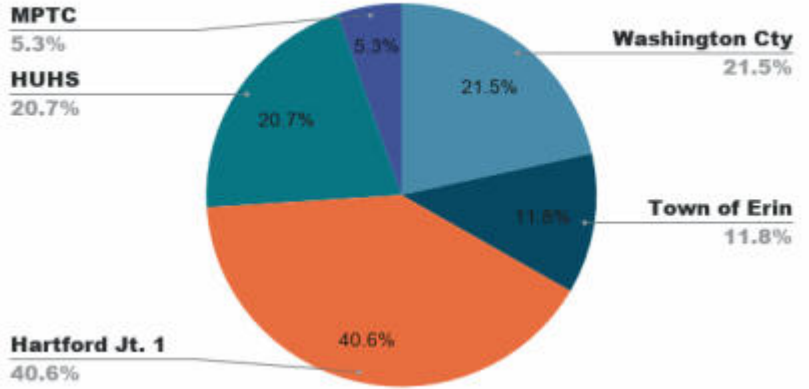

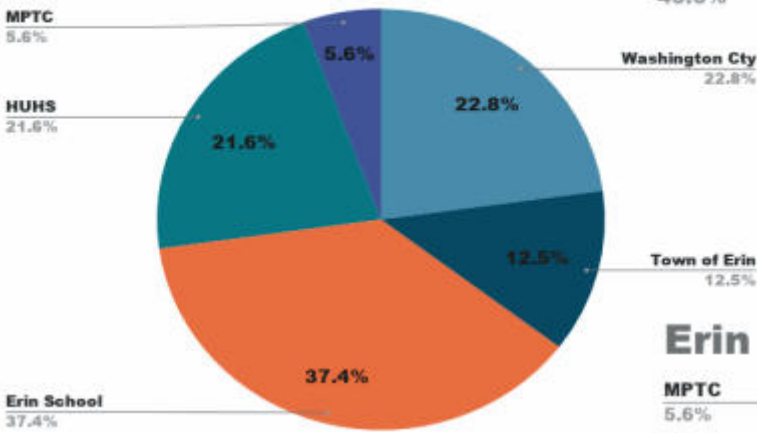

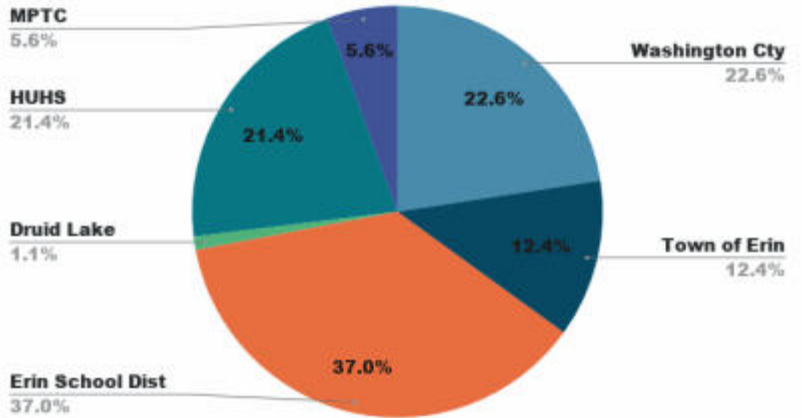

Erin School District

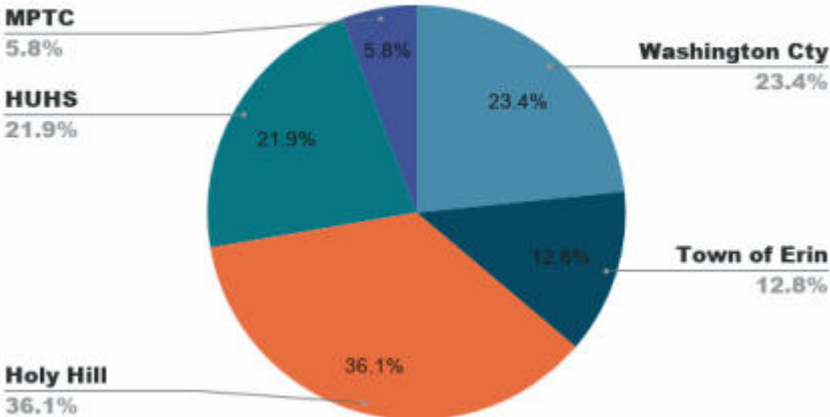


Erin School Dist. with Druid Lake

Safety Upgrades for Erin Town Hall

As we all continue to deal with the effects of COVID-19, Erin is making a few changes to the town hall to help create a safer environment.

Thanks to funding through the federal CARES Act's Coronavirus Relief Fund, the town is able to update its facility and provide full reimbursement for additional safety measures.

- The front doors are now handicap accessible.
- Town staff now work from a window installed in the hall vestibule, keeping them and residents safely separated.
- Touch-free toilets, sinks and hand dryers in the bathrooms provide a safer experience.
- New chairs and tables that are more easily cleaned after each use
- Locked mailboxes for town officials located outside the main office to eliminate unnecessary interaction with staff
- Upgraded computers to accommodate remote meetings
- An institutional-grade disinfectant sprayer
- A hands-free water bottle filler

The construction project also includes closing the window between the office and hall to provide more storage while eliminating the unnecessary window.

While residents visiting the hall will conduct routine business through the new window, those needing time with individual staff are always welcome in the town hall for those meetings.

The project was paid entirely through the Coronavirus Relief Fund's Route to Recovery pro-

gram. The program, administered through the state of Wisconsin, allocated a specific portion of the program funds to every county, city, village and town. Erin's allocation was \$62,071 for 2020. It's unclear if additional funds will be made available this year.

See something, say something

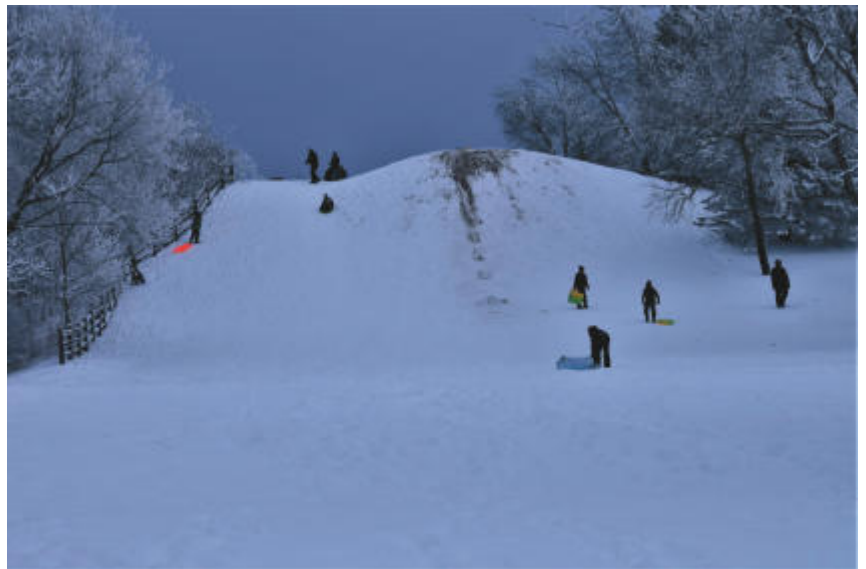
The town of Erin experienced a significant increase in vandalism and theft of street signs and posts in 2020.

According to the town's Road Department, 32 signs were vandalized last February and an additional 11 signs and six posts in late November. Nearly all were done within neighborhoods near homes.

When street signs and posts are vandalized or stolen, it results in an additional financial burden on the town. If you see this activity in your neighborhood, please report it to authorities as soon as possible.

with all the snow we have received. It is wonderful to see so many folks in the park. Park Manager Todd Kozlencer already has his to-do list for spring.

We completed the landscaping of the former rental house area and new salt shed installation; however, it was done late in the season, so we may need to do some reseeded. New aluminum soccer benches for all players will be in place for the spring soccer season. New alternate basket placement is coming this year on some of the disc golf holes. Painting of the disc golf rocks with distances will also be redone.

As mentioned in our fall 2020 update, we needed to remove 17 ash trees from the park, so please remember that tree donations in a loved one's name are always appreciated. Contact Erin Town Clerk Julie Kriewaldt for information.

Roads Department Update by Dan Coffey, Road Commission Chairman

Why do we crack fill and chip seal roads in reasonable condition while badly deteriorated roads are ignored? Crack filling and chip sealing a road can offer double or triple the life of the road at 10 percent of the cost of rebuilding.

The majority of town roads do not have a solid base, which is why they crack. If water permeates the cracks, each thaw/freeze cycle moves the road base due to water expansion promoting deterioration. Chip sealing allows the road to flex without major cracks opening.

When roads reach a certain level of deterioration, the only option is to repair the base and repave the road. Due to financial restraints, we rebuild roads as budget allows along with crack filling and chip sealing other roads.

2021 Project

Our 2021 major road project is rebuilding the road base and paving Emerald Drive from St. Augustine Road to Shamrock Lane. In the last several years, the short stretch of road has consumed one-half of our yearly pot-hole repair material. EMS, school bus drivers, and the Hartford and Richfield Fire Departments have all endorsed and encouraged the repair. Leadership and members of the Hartford Fire Department are concerned that two engines could not pass each other due to tree branch and brush growth. All are looking forward to the repair.

2020 Projects

2020 was a good year for road repair projects. We were able to rebuild the base and pave Robins Run and a stretch of St. Augustine Road from Highway Q to Monches Road. Other projects included seal-coating part of County Line Road, Roosevelt Road East, Skibbereen Way, S. Limerick Lane, and Limerick Court. About 1000 ash trees were removed from several roads. We're still working on stump grinding. It is an ongoing battle to remove ash trees before they fall. We have many types of trees that prosper in our area. Town residents are encouraged to plant trees on their property. Washington County Planning & Parks Department sells trees, shrubs, and much more. Equipment

The Town of Erin has three plow trucks for snow removal. Due to age (2001) and rust-related issues, we will purchase a new truck. Good maintenance and constant cleaning by the road crew have allowed us to get 20 years of service from the existing truck.

apply for their children to attend school districts other than the one in which they live. Students in 5-year-old kindergarten to grade 12 may apply to participate in open enrollment. Open enrollment for 4-year-old kindergarten and early childhood education is limited. Contact Donna to find out if your child qualifies for open enrollment.

How and when parents may apply

The open enrollment application period for the 2020-21 school year is Feb. 1 to April 30. **Late applications will not be accepted for any reason.** Parents may apply online during the application period at <http://dpi.wi.gov/open-enrollment>. Contact us if you do not have internet access.

Child Find

Erin School District is required to locate, identify, and evaluate all children with disabilities, including children with disabilities attending private schools in the school district, as well as homeless children. If you have concerns regarding your child, contact the school at 262-673-3720.

Looking for a job where you can pick the days you work? Do you like working with kids? Erin school is looking for substitute teachers.

A Three-Year Short-Term Substitute license may be issued to an applicant who holds a degree from an accredited college or university and who has successfully completed an approved substitute training program, but has not completed a state-approved educator preparation program. Once an educator holds a current Three-Year Short-Term Substitute license, they are eligible to short-term

substitute at any Wisconsin school district. Erin School is looking to add to our sub list.

An area of additional focus was air quality. We have our HVAC units filtering/circulating the air at a high level for a safe environment for staff, students and visitors. Although there are still projects in the works, the improvements made so far are having a positive impact on the learning and working environment in the building.

Bookkeeper by Cheryl Johrendt

Changes to school funding formulas have resulted in a slight increase in General State Aid for the district. This change offsets the amount of taxes residents pay. Erin School has a fiscal responsibility to its taxpayers to ensure the valuable resources we receive

are put to best use. While the pandemic has played a big role in the budget, the additional aid was a welcomed change in funding.

With the funding changes, Erin reduced its tax levy for the 2020-21 school year. While the average tax bill is reduced, it does not mean every individual taxpayer will see a decrease. Homeowners who added an addition or enhancement to their property could potentially see an increase. The assessed value of a property determines the amount of taxes. Continuous monitoring of the budget (revenues and expenses) allows Erin to provide high-quality programs, appealing and updated facilities, and passionate, dedicated and committed staff. Erin School District is committed to providing the best quality education now and in the future.

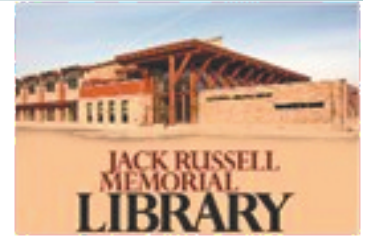

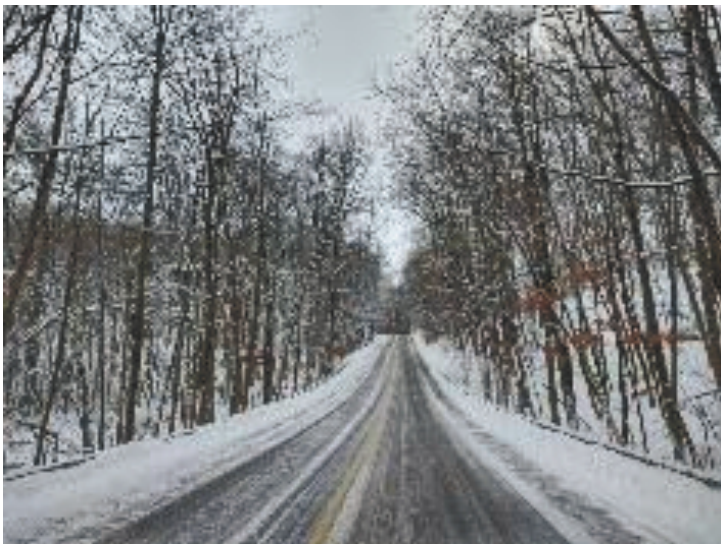

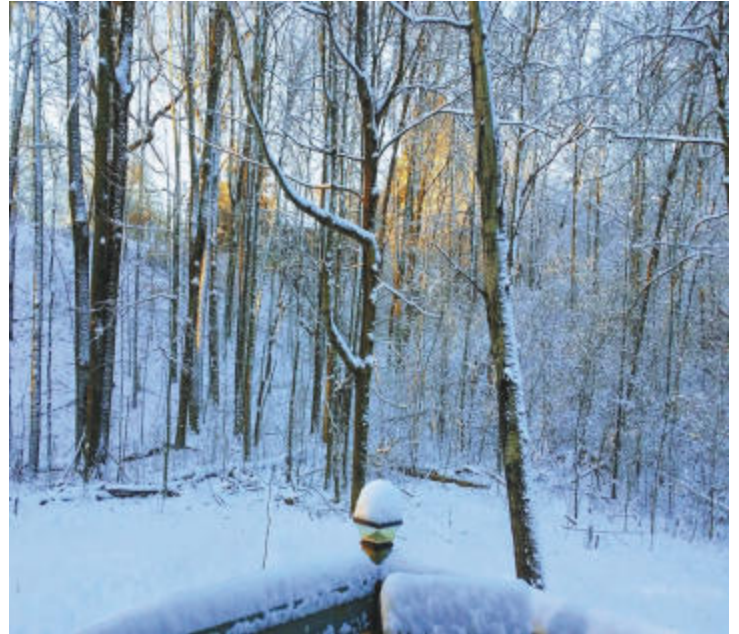
