Elections

Next year will be a busy election year. It is time to check your voter registration status.

If you have moved, changed your name, turned 18, or have never voted, the easiest way to register is to go to myvote.wi.gov. Registering or checking your status early will help you to avoid any additional lines on election day. To register on this site, the address on your driver's license must match the address you are registering. If you do this at least 21 days before an election, your name will appear on the poll list on election day. When registering to vote at myvote.wi.gov you are not required to provide proof of residency but, keep in mind, in order to register in person you will need to provide proof of residency.

2024 is a presidential election year, which means you will soon be finding voter registration forms and absentee ballot request forms in your mailbox. These mailings are not from me, even though they may appear to be. They are sent by special interest groups and the prefilled voter information on the forms is often inaccurate. To ensure you are properly registered or to apply for an absentee ballot, please visit myvote.wi.gov, contact me at 262-673-3682 or email clerk@erintownship.com.

Please remember, to get an absentee ballot in the mail for any election, I must have the request in writing and a copy of your photo ID.

Spring primary, if needed - February 20, 2024

Spring election and presidential preference – April 2, 2024

Partisan primary – August 13, 2024

General election - November 5, 2024

Snow Season

The snow season is coming, whether we like it or not. According to the state statute, the driver of a vehicle that is not a plow but following a plow must remain 75 feet back from the plow if the speed limit on the road is 35 mph or less (\$346.915 (2)2). Do not try to pass the plow as the plow drivers cannot always see you. Also, please do not place your garbage cans directly on the road. It is recommended that

you place your cans at the end of your driveway approximately 3-4 feet from the edge of the pavement to ensure that they do not get pushed too far back or knocked over.

Emergency Management / Law Enforcement by Bradley Bautz, Director

Fire Prevention Week is Oct. 8-14, 2023. There are many tips available on the internet at www.NFPA.org/FPW.



Feel free to call your specific fire department, Ashippun, Hartford or Richfield, if you have safety questions. Each of the departments will have inperson events.

I am working on new fire contracts with Ashippun and Richfield, as the current ones expire at year's end.

Also, if you are out cleaning up the yard, please make sure that your driveway has enough clearance for an ambulance or fire truck to get up to your house. Low hanging branches can damage their equipment.

If your address sign gets damaged or needs replacement, contact the town. They are replaced free of charge. This is to ensure they stay up and help emergency responders for years to come.

Please follow the burning ordinance. We have had several complaints last year involving burning. Please be cognizant of conditions before you burn. Your fire must be attended at all times. You must be near the fire. You cannot burn during a burning ban. Do not burn if the wind speed is greater than 12 miles per hour. Violations can result in a citation. The rules for burning are set forth below as found in Chapter 168 of

the town code.

No burning permits are required

•When fire danger is high, very high, or severe, all outdoor burning will be banned (this includes fireworks, which are already restricted by county ordinance) by order of the emergency management director or town chairman. Outdoor cooking (i.e., grills) is an exemption. For such a ban I will notify the sheriff's office and local radio stations. Notices will also be found on the town posting boards and on the website.

At any time of year:

- •Open fires must be attended at all times
- •The jurisdictional fire department or preferably the Washington County Sheriff's Office must be notified of any bonfire in excess of 10 ft in diameter or if a large area of grass is burned (i.e., over ¼ acre).
- •Fires cannot be started on the roadway surface and only leaves and grass can be burned in the right of-way.
- •The burning of garbage, plastics, rubber, treated wood, petroleum products or anything that emits noxious or toxic odors is PROHIBITED. The DNR already bans the burning of these items as they pose a health hazard to residents if burned.
- •DNR regulations also prohibit businesses from disposing of solid waste by burning.

It has been a busy summer with the Spectrum project going on, together with the State working on Hwy. 83

(Roads, Continued from page 3) and our repaving projects all happening simultaneously. I am happy to report the State finished the southern section of Hwy 83 early enough that they will be beginning work on the northern section, specifically the bridge over the Ashippun River, on Sept. 12.

The town's paving projects were completed for approximately \$58,000 less than projected, which allowed for all planned chip seal work to be completed. This was an excellent team effort by our road crew and the road commission members.

Bids were received for the replacement of the failed heating units in the road shop and the installation of a ventilation system, which will bring the HVAC system to the current code. Helm Service out of Waukesha will be completing that work this fall.

Unfortunately, we have had unplanned repairs to the majority of the town's equipment. This has been an unanticipated expense which has exceeded the budgeted amount. However, the work must be done and the equipment is needed to make that happen. Rest assured, I and the road commission will be looking into potential causes for these breakdowns and ways to reduce them in the future.

Washington County Humane Society

At the time of this writing, the small animal ward is home to the usual suspects: Lop-eared rabbits, Abyssinian guinea pigs, and standard rats. It's also home to an out-of-the-

ordinary guest: a Leopard gecko. Raptor, so aptly named, came to WCHS as a surrendered pet. He was likely purchased from a pet store. Unfortunately, WCHS sees many small animals in similar cycles. The small animal ward at WCHS is one of the most bustling and buzzing areas in the shelter. Guinea pigs burrow in their timothy hay, rabbits hop to the water bowl for a quick sip, and Raptor the gecko scurries to his beloved heat lamp for some UV therapy. Squeaks, chirps, and oinks echo off the walls, exuding a chorus of contentment and vitality. WCHS aims to recognize our mighty mammals only millimeters tall, the volunteers who dote on them, and how our community can help them find families of their own.

Families may not realize the amount of care needed when buying and later decide it's too much. That's where our volunteers step in. WCHS has a small team of dedicated cleaning volunteers, and an even smaller team of cleaners who look after small animals and know exactly how to care for them. Armed with experience, our core small animal volunteers know the humidity level Raptor needs to thrive, the correct veggies our guineas need to have a healthy GI tract, and which pets can be paired and which to separate. Washington County Humane Society (WCHS) staff lean heavily on their expertise and take their advice when given.

Small animals tend to have the longest length of stay at WCHS. This trend is not uncommon among shelters and rescues, though it is unfortunate. Education lies at the heart of the solution. Families that are equipped with the knowledge of care and handling, as well as the expectation of hard work, will greatly enjoy having a small animal. Likewise, pets comfortable in their new homes will reciprocate love 10x stronger, and that's a pretty big deal. 

On August 8, The Tennies family gathered at the Wisconsin State Fair to celebrate their



farmstead turning 100 years old. Three generations of the family were represented as Franklin Tennies received the iconic "Century Farm" sign to display at his farm.

The Tennies name is well-known to the St. Patrick's "family" and the Town of Erin since 1923, when Joseph P., Sr. and Alice E. purchased the farm on October 15,

1923 from the Barnett family. Dick and Lucy Ann Barnett purchased the farm in 1914 from James Connor (aka James O'Connor), who purchased the land from the U.S. Government. The farm is located just west of Erin School and all the previous owners of the farm are buried at Old and New St. Patrick Cemeteries.

Joe and Alice had six children, one of them Franklin. Frank received all his Sacraments at St. Patrick's Church along with his six siblings. On July 14, 1962 he married Cresentia "Grace" Youngbauer, and that year

they purchased the Tennies farm from Frank's mom and con-

tinued cash crop farming for about 20 years. Grace was the Secretary at Erin School for over 15 years and retired in 2001. Both Frank and Grace were very involved at St. Patrick's — Grace as President of the Ladies Altar Society and also sang in the choir and Frank as a parish council member, usher, lector and the last President of the Holy Name Society.

We pay tribute to the amazing past family farming generations (Connor, Barnett and Tennies) who first laid down roots in Wisconsin's fertile farmland, and to the present Tennies family, who have kept the dream alive for future generations.
