Elections

First and foremost, I would like to take a moment to thank all our Election Inspectors for their hard work creating an election process where everything ran as smoothly as possible. I would also like to thank JC's Corner for donating food for everyone working at the polling location.

The 2024 General election brought a 92% voter turnout for the Town of Erin. This year brings two elections, Feb. 18th Primary, if needed, and April 1st Spring Election, for local offices, school boards and state offices.

Dog licenses

All dogs five months and older are required to be licensed annually by March 31. Dog license applications are required for each dog, complete with the license fee and a copy of the rabies certificate. The certificate is returned with your license in a self-addressed stamped envelope you provide. There is a \$10 late fee if the dog is not licensed by March 31. This only applies to puppies that are five months old or older. Dogs acquired throughout the year may be licensed at that time.

Hartford and the Village of Richfield. The Hartford contract also includes border protections of the same nature as the previous contract. As expected, the costs of those services have risen substantially. Since it appears there will be no let up to increasing costs of Fire and EMS services, the town and other governmental units will continue to work with the county in an effort to find cost savings, particularly those that apply to Fire and EMS Services.

The town is continuing its negotiations with our tower company regarding their lease payments to the town. We hope to resolve that soon.

In our continuing efforts to keep up with our road repairs, the town authorized borrowing money to pay for several needed road construction projects. By doing so, we hope to have more of our town roads meet criteria for continued maintenance rather than the ongoing necessity of reconstruction.

A reminder - we do have elections this April for several town positions. Parks has more details, but the town is looking for a Parks lead person to replace Tod who has chosen to step down. Any interested person, please contact the Clerk. Thank You to Tod for all he has done for the town.

Hopefully by the time this newsletter arrives, there will be snow on the sledding hill for kids to enjoy. As I write this, the hill has only been used twice, which is unfortunate.

The new baseball pavilion continues to take shape. Windows and doors should be in sometime in February with interior plumbing and electrical work beginning in earnest.

In the spring, new lighting will be added to the town hall and parking lot area and also a gutter system will be added on the west side of the town hall building. This should help to alleviate the water pooling on the south side of the town hall. In addition, the south town hall parking lot will be reconfigured to hopefully end the water issue where the road

equipment is stored. The outside of the Erin Town Hall will be painted as soon as weather permits.

The Town is looking for a seasonal, part-time employee to work under the direction of the park superintendent to do lawn mowing, trimming, landscape maintenance, small tree trimming and removal, and performing duties necessary for park maintenance. Good communication skills with the baseball, soccer and disc golf clubs are a plus.

The position is seasonal beginning in April and ending in late October with hours to be determined by the park's supervisor. The majority of the hours are from May through September.

Applicants should be at least 16 years old, have knowledge of and be able to operate lawn mowing equipment and garden power tools, lift at least 50 pounds and have a valid driver's license.

Roads Department by Town Supervisor Dean Schober

There are a number of projects that we will be doing in 2025. As you may have heard, the Town Board has approved of the Town borrowing 1.7 million dollars to allow some larger paving projects to be completed. As stated in the past, the road budget pays for about 2-2.5 miles of hot mix re-paving per year. We have three high-traffic paving projects that would have to be divided over several years to complete. The price of paving goes up at least 5% per year. We were able to obtain a 10-year note at 5.25% and use the \$200,000 from the referendum passed three years ago to make the payments on the loan. This means we can

complete three large projects this season. Larger projects yield lower bids because the companies know they will be working in the same area for a longer period without the cost of moving machinery. The roads being done using this funding are:

Terry Road (CTH O to Hwy 83) Emerald Drive Monches Road

The Town is experiencing an issue with water coming into the Highway Shop, in part because the "South Parking Lot" is in poor condition, with many low areas and poor pitch. The soccer fields to the South are significantly higher than the parking lot and runoff from them goes onto and across the parking lot toward the building. The construction of the new baseball pavilion will also increase water draining onto the lot due to increased roof area and the need to raise the grade around the building.

There is also an issue with water coming up through the floor in the shop and there is some historical indication there may have been some water issues when the foundation for the south end of the building was built, which could explain the situation. If let go, this could lead to the need for costly foundation and water abatement work.

The town engineer has developed a plan to address the problem and the Town Board has approved the use of some federal funding and money unused from last year's road budget, due to judicious management of the projects undertaken in 2024. These funds will cover the cost to remove the existing pavement, ensure that the base is adequate, and determine if groundwater abatement is needed in order to prevent damage to the foundation. The lot will then be reshaped, re-graded and new pavement applied. Bids were obtained for this work and the low bid was \$89,284.61 by Kartechner Brothers LLC of Waupun. The lot will need to be closed while the work is completed.



application on Waterford Road, Pleasant Hill Road, and St. Patrick Lane has also been obtained. We again received Shared Revenue Credit (\$31,000) from Washington County. This will be used to trim and cut trees along roads in the town. This means you will see Washington County Crews cutting trees on township roads.

At the January Road Commission meeting, additional projects will be discussed and bid requests posted for work like chip sealing and other road maintenance projects.

- 2. Construction Management Selection: The interest in our work has exceeded expectations, with twelve construction management firms expressing interest—more than the predicted nine or ten. The team is in the process of narrowing this list to a manageable number of firms for interviews, with a recommendation for the selected firm anticipated to be done by February 2025.



In September 2024, St. Kilian's Parish announced the sale of the St. Patrick's property. We are thrilled to announce that Don and Mary Jane Gallo, who reside in the Town of Erin, have submitted an offer to purchase the property. The Gallo family will be presenting a unique development plan at the February 10, 2025 Plan Commission Meeting that will allow for the preservation of the 170-year-old historic Church and rectory. This plan will ensure the future of the Church and rectory as well as the peaceful rural setting.

In addition, Don is collaborating with the Milwaukee Archdiocese to discuss conditions of use. He is also securing bids for new furnace/air conditioning units for the Church and rectory, new siding, and windows for the rectory. Also, he is consulting on Church disability accessibility, ADA bathrooms, exterior lighting, and landscaping.

It is their plan to have St. Patrick's Church and Recto-

ry restored to their original intent for service to God and the Church, the Rectory as a home for a religious order, and the Church available for services and celebrations.

If approvals are received by the Town of Erin, closing may optimistically take place at the end of April or May 2025. We are more than grateful to the Gallo family, who have reached out to members of the St. Patrick's Preservation Fund to share their ideas to ensure St. Patrick's exists for another 100+ years.



Emergency Management / Enforcement Officer By Bradley Bautz

I want to take a moment to highlight some of the work done over the past year. There has been new town legislation and agreements to ensure the safety and well-being of the residents of the Town. I have been working to ensure we are safe, prepared, and well-positioned for the future.

1. Hartford Intermunicipal Agreement

- I was on the negotiating team for the town that secured a new 20-year agreement with the City of Hartford.
- The previous 20-year agreement, which I also helped negotiate, expired last year.
- This agreement protects the town from any potential annexation and loss of town land, and the city adoption of our zoning ordinances within three miles of the border.
- The city will continue providing fire protection and paramedic-level EMS service.
- The funding formula for fire/rescue services was adjusted, moving from being based on equalized value to being tied to the CPI-U (Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers), which offers more stability in funding, hopefully eliminating yearly 20%+ increases.

2. Richfield Fire Contract

- Following the dissolution of the Richfield Volunteer Fire Company, the village has taken over its fire/rescue services, creating the Richfield Fire Department.
- Village residents approved a new referendum to provide additional funding for added personnel.
- A one-year contract was signed to continue the relationship between the town and the newly municipalized department, which now serves all of the Village of Richfield and part of Erin with paramedic-level EMS service.

3. ATV/UTV Ordinance

- The town board approved an ordinance to allow ATV/UTVs on town roads.
- Specific regulations apply, including driver age and licensing requirements, insurance, operational hours, speed limits, restrictions on cruising, and open intoxicants.
- The ordinance will be periodically reviewed for adjustments.
- We tried to strike a balance between recreation and safety with clear guidelines for residents.
- It will not be valid until the roads are posted with signs.

4. U.S. Women's Open (May 28 - June 1)

- Ongoing planning efforts continue for the 2025 U.S. Women's Open golf tournament, including coordination with the Washington County Sheriff's Office for law enforcement and other agencies for traffic and security.
- The event will require extensive cooperation between local, state, and federal entities.

5. Emergency Operations Plan

• Following the US Open, I hope to start updating the town's Emergency Operations Plan, with input from community stakeholders to ensure preparedness for various emergencies.

6. Washington County Hazard Mitigation Plan

• The town board adopted an updated county hazard mitigation plan, which will continue the eligibility for federal grants and other disaster relief programs.

7. Animal Ordinance

- The town adopted a new animal ordinance to address licensing issues, dangerous animals, and other concerns that were either not covered by county code or required referral to the county.
- Every dog over five months old is required to be licensed with the Town.
