### Clerk’s Corner by Carrie Bruha, Town Clerk

We may have three elections this year:  
 April 7: Presidential Preference Primary and the Spring Election.  
 Aug. 11: Partisan Primary  
 Nov. 3: General Election

Voters can check their voter registration status or request an absentee ballot online at MyVoteWI. Register by mail or MyVoteWI until the third Wednesday before an election (must be postmarked). After then, registration is required in the clerk’s office until 5 p.m. on the Friday before an election or on election day.

MyVote WI, (<https://myvote.wi.gov/en-us/>) also allows a registered voter to request an absentee ballot. If the clerk does not have a copy of the photo ID on record, it will prompt the voter to attach a copy. Voters can also request an absentee ballot by email (please use [clerk@erin.wi.gov](mailto:clerk@erin.wi.gov)) or mail. It must be in writing. Voters cannot request an absentee ballot for someone else. When requesting an absentee ballot, include your name, the address where you are registered in Erin, the address to mail the ballot and the election(s).

Permanent overseas voters, military voters or temporary overseas voters may receive a ballot by email or fax.

Absentee ballots must be mailed or returned to the clerk on or before the election day. Please allow enough time (three days if local and at least one week if out of state) for the clerk to receive your ballot. Wisconsin does not allow ballots returned by email or faxed.

Photo ID is required for voting.

#### Dog licenses due March 31

All dogs 5 months and older must be licensed annually by March 31. The application is on the town website under Forms. To license your dog(s), complete one application per dog, the license fee (check or cash), the rabies certificate (this is returned to the owner) and a stamped self-addressed envelope. There is a \$10 late fee if the dog is not licensed by March 31. This does not apply to puppies too young to license or if you acquire a dog later in the year.

#### Tax receipts

Instructions for printing your tax receipt from the Washington County website:

- Go to [www.washcowisco.gov](http://www.washcowisco.gov)
- On the left side of the main page, click on **Taxes/Assessment information**. This will take you to the Washington County Ascent Land Records site
- Choose the municipality by clicking on the drop-down and pick T3-TOWN OF ERIN
- You can search by last name, street number or parcel ID.
- Once you find your parcel, click on the **red parcel number** and it will take you to your parcel

- Choose the Select Detail Taxes
- Click on the correct tax year
- A small box will open, click on **Printer Friendly**
- The next screen will open from which you can print the receipt

## Zoning News and Reminders

As spring approaches, many residents begin planning outdoor projects, like installing a new swimming pool or upgrading an existing one. Before you dig in, the Town of Erin would like to remind property owners to review and follow the Town's swimming pool regulations to ensure safety, compliance, and smooth project approval.

Town regulations apply to constructed swimming pools (not ponds), whether in-ground or above-ground, that meet any of the following criteria:

- A depth greater than **three feet**
- A diameter greater than **12 feet**
- A surface area greater than **120 square feet**

These pools are permitted in districts that allow residential use, provided the following requirements are met:

### Location

- Pools must be set back a **minimum of 10 feet** from all side and rear lot lines.

### Drainage

- Pool drains must be located so water discharge occurs at **least 25 feet** from any septic field or drywell.
- Drainage may **not** flow onto or over a neighboring property.

## Fencing and Safety Measures

- In-ground pools must be completely enclosed by a **non-climbable fence** at least four feet high, with a locking gate.
- Automatic pool covers may be used instead of fencing if they are ASTM F1346 - 91 compliant. These covers must:
  - ◇ Support at least **485 pounds**
  - ◇ Pass perimeter deflection and surface drainage tests
  - ◇ Restrict access when the pool is not in use
  - ◇ Be operated by a **key switch or touchpad**
  - ◇ Be installed by a **certified professional**
  - ◇ Have documentation submitted to the Town prior to use
- Above ground pools with a deck height above four feet are generally exempt from fencing; however, all ladders, steps, or access points must be secured with a locking gate.
- A portion of a building may serve as part of the enclosure if the pool is located at least 10 feet from the building.

## Electrical Safety

- Pools must be located at least 20 feet from overhead electric power lines.
- A minimum 10-foot horizontal clearance is required from service drops or other open overhead wiring.
- All outlets serving pool equipment must be protected by a ground current interrupter (GFCI).
- All applicable state and local electrical codes must be followed.



Planning ahead and understanding these requirements can help prevent delays, ensure safety, and protect neighboring properties. If you're considering a pool project this season, please review the full code or contact the Town of Erin with any questions before construction begins.

Enjoy the warmer weather — and swim safely!



## Emergency Management/Enforcement Officer

Welcome to winter. A reminder that if Dennis Kenealy or I declare a snow emergency, vehicles cannot be parked on or along any town-maintained road. This is done during larger snowfall events. As a matter of practice during any snow event, please do not park vehicles on or along the roadway. If a vehicle goes into the ditch, it should be removed as soon as possible. It also must be removed by a licensed towing service for the safety of all and to prevent other crashes.

The State of Wisconsin finally developed guidelines for small municipalities to use as a format for their Emergency Operations Plan. I will be reviewing and updating our plan accordingly.

ATV and UTV use on town roads is allowed. All town roads are UTV routes. Chapter 350 of Town Code governs their use. However, they are NOT allowed on all county roads. They are not allowed on

Hwy Q east of Hwy K, because Waukesha County does not allow them on the roadways. They are also not allowed on state highways, which includes Hwy 83 and Hwy 167. No, you cannot drive the ATV/UTV to the town park. Also, operation in the town is only allowed between 5 a.m. and 10 p.m. Operating ATVs/UTVs between 10 p.m. and 5 a.m. is a town violation.

## BURNING

Please follow the burning ordinance. We had several complaints last year involving burning. Please be cognizant of conditions before you burn. It can be especially dangerous during the spring after the snow melt before everything “greens” up. In November 2020, there was a large grass fire off of Erin Road that required the evacuation of some homes in the area. Fourteen fire departments responded to extinguish the fire.

Your fire must be attended at all times. You must be near the fire. You cannot burn during a burning ban. Do not burn if the wind speed is greater than 12 miles per hour. Violations can result in a citation from the town. Follow the rules:

- No burning permits are required
- When fire danger is high, very high, or severe, all outdoor burning is banned (this includes fireworks, which are already restricted by county ordinance) by order of the emergency management director, or town chairman.
- Outdoor cooking is an exemption. For such a ban, I will notify

the sheriff’s office and local radio stations. Notices will also be posted on the town posting boards and website.

At any time of year:

- Open fires must be attended at all times
- The jurisdictional fire department or preferably the Washington County Sheriff’s Office must be notified of any bonfire in excess of 10 feet in diameter or if a large area of grass is burned, typically more than a quarter acre.
- Fires can’t be started on the roadway surface, and only leaves and grass can be burned in the right-of-way.
- The burning of garbage, plastics, rubber, treated wood, petroleum products or anything that emits noxious or toxic odors is PROHIBITED. The DNR already bans the burning of these items as they pose a health hazard to residents.
- DNR regulations also prohibit businesses from disposing of solid waste by burning.

Have a safe and happy winter and spring.

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



Erin School Next Steps: Capital Referendum Thank You For Taking The Community Survey! Thank you, Erin, for participating in our community survey. We had a 36% response rate. According to School Perceptions, the typical response rate is under 20% .



### Erin's Community Survey Says:

of respondents would support a referendum of around \$2.9 million if the top priorities focused on safety, security, system, and building improvements.



The Board of Education carefully reviewed your feedback. After considering community interest and overall cost, the Board reduced the proposed referendum to \$2.75 million over 15 years. The need for air conditioning will be addressed through a separate fundraising campaign.

The Board of Education remains committed to being responsible stewards of your tax dollars while continuing to provide a strong K-8 educational experience for our students.

### How We Got Here — and Why Now

The timeline on page 6 shows that Erin School has worked diligently for many years to maintain its facilities. Historically, we addressed facility needs through the annual operating budget. Recent projects have included:

- Replacing a well that recently failed
- Repairing sections of the roof
- Repairing the septic system
- Updating the HVAC system and boilers
- Remodeling kindergarten through third-grade classrooms

However, we are no longer able to keep up with these growing needs through the regular budget alone. State revenue limits have not kept pace with inflation or the increasing costs of maintaining school facilities.

To fund major facility projects, school districts ask voters for additional support through a capital referendum. In fact, nearly 99% of Wisconsin school districts have pursued a capital referendum. Erin is one of only four districts (out of 421) that has not.

## What Would the District Use the Funds For? Facility Challenges

The District hired an independent firm to evaluate the condition of the school building, which was originally constructed in 1958. The findings of this report were a starting point for the District. ## Safety and Security Improvements

- space into a classroom and add a receiving area at the back of the school. Repair and reconfigure the parking lot to improve traffic flow, drainage, and overall safety.
- Update school entrances with new, secure doors to enhance building security.
- Repair sections of the front entrance foundation that are sinking and address damaged concrete in this area.

## Renovations

- Convert existing custodial Currently, small-group instruction is taking place in hallways and offices.
- Update classrooms in the 1979 and 1992 building additions, including addressing ADA compliance needs.

## System Updates

- Upgrade outdated electrical, HVAC, and plumbing systems, some of which date back to the original 1958 construction and are nearing the end of their useful life.

## Why Funding Is Needed

The cost of addressing these critical safety, facility, and infrastructure needs exceeds what can be funded through the District's annual operating budget.



On days your child isn't in their scheduled classroom session, our Extended Day program provides a supportive, and engaging environment—just across the hallway from their 4K classroom!

Children enjoy a full day filled with:

- Hands-on learning centers
- Play-based activities
- Recess and movement
- Rest time
- Learning and growing through play

We also offer Before and After School care for all students - This takes place in our multi-purpose room (cafeteria) and is billed at \$3.50/hour (billed in 15 minute increments, price is subject to change). Children can be dropped off as early as 6:30 a.m., directly at the multi-purpose room doors, in the back of the building and are billed until 7:30. Anyone can be dropped off at 7:30 a.m. for no charge. Students are dismissed to their classrooms at 7:50 a.m.

## Open Enrollment –February 2 - April 30, 2026

The open enrollment program allows parents to apply for their children to attend school districts other than the one in which they live. Students in 5-year-old kindergarten to grade 12 may apply to participate in open enrollment. Open enrollment for 4-year-old kindergarten and early childhood education is limited. Please contact Donna Runte to find out if your preschool-aged children qualify for open enrollment.

How and when parents may apply? The open enrollment application period for the 2026-27 school year is from February 2 - April 30, 2026. Late applications will not be accepted for any reason. Parents may apply on-line during the application period at <https://dpi.wi.gov/open-enrollment>. If you do not have access to the internet, please contact us



pool update, which is scheduled to be finished in Spring of 2026.



The excitement doesn't stop there. Construction officially kicked off in December for our technical education addition. This new facility will house an 8,000-square-foot construction lab and classroom, complete with a specialized plumbing mezzanine designed for hands-on plumbing instruction and procedures, as well as mock houses. These hands-on experiences will afford students the opportunity to master essential skills such as roofing, siding, electrical, drywall, and window installation. This addition will complement our already thriving technical education facilities.

Looking ahead to the summer of 2026, we have another project on the horizon: a comprehensive roof replacement. This work will involve a full tear-off and replacement, along with the resurfacing of 75% of our total roof, ensuring the long-term integrity of our buildings.

Also slated for summer 2026 are several other key projects, including generator and HVAC replacements, replacement of our current practice field with state-of-the-art turf; track replacement; regrading of the soccer fields; and completion of our district-wide LED upgrade. This LED initiative is already paying dividends, having earned us most recently over \$63,000 in Focus on Energy incentives and other rebates.

Life is good at HUHS. We are incredibly proud of our academic achievements and deeply grateful for the community's support in building a brighter future for our students. Thank you for being an essential part of the HUHS family.

## St. Patrick Preservation by Maureen Fitzsimons-Vanden Heuvel

In 2025, St. Patrick's Church very quietly celebrated its 170th anniversary. No Masses or Irish Catholic traditions have been celebrated for a number of years and then, much like Brigadoon, St. Patrick's got its own little bit of Irish magic, and it woke up!

☘ I'm sure many of you have noticed all of the activity. A fresh coat of paint on both the church and the rectory, clearing of brush and overgrown trees and bushes, grading and landscaping.

☘ The church interior is in wonderful condition and the organ plays as beautifully as before. The rectory has required a great deal of cleaning, repairs and necessary updates, including the bathroom soon to be completed.

☘ The Milwaukee Archdiocese has given permission for the church to be used as a wedding chapel for non-denominational weddings and for Catholic weddings with a case-by-case review and approval by the Archdiocese. To be clear, Saint Patrick's Chapel is no longer a Catholic Church within the Milwaukee Archdiocese; however, permission is being granted for special Masses and prayer services. No nuptial Masses nor funeral Masses will be allowed at St. Patrick's, as those must be held in a parish church.

☘ After many years of being inactive, a Catholic Prayer Service near and dear to everyone Irish—the Rosary—was held on May 13, 2025. More than 20 people prayed on the front steps of Saint Patrick's Church with a beautiful statue of the Blessed Virgin Mary in honor of Our Lady of Fatima and the election of our first American Pope, Leo XIV.

We were also honored to have Fr. Andrew Linn come for a St Francis of Assisi blessing of the animals Oct. 5 during the Leah Fenney Benefit Soccer Tournament for which we shared our parking lots. Animals included puppies and ponies that were there for pony rides, our first official fundraiser.

Most recently to celebrate the Christmas season, we wished everyone passing by "Merry Christmas" on the sign in front of St. Patrick's and the display of a sparkling Nativity scene and shooting star. A single candle appeared on Christmas Eve in the front window of the rectory—which is an Irish tradition to welcome the baby Jesus.

The most exciting announcement for this New Year is a **St. Patrick's Day Mass on Tuesday, March 17, at 9:15 a.m.** commemorating the return of a tradition that took place for many years. 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
